Niel Gow's oak on the bank of the River Tay near Dunkeld in Perthshire is Scotland's first entry to the European Tree of the Year contest. According to local legend this ancient oak, also known as the fiddle tree, is the one under which Gow wrote many of his fiddle tunes, which are still played today at ceilidhs and concerts around the world.

Scotland is competing against nine other countries in Europe and public voting is open until the end of February. At this early stage we are trailing in 6th place, but we are gradually gathering support and with your help I hope that we can secure a good result. Votes can be registered at <u>www.treeoftheyear.org</u>

If you are able to support the campaign in any way, through social media, on your website or in an email or notice to your members or other organisations that have similar interests, this would be a big boost to the campaign and help Scotland's chances.

Tree of the Year is an annual contest to find Europe's best loved trees. It aims to raise awareness of the cultural and natural value of ancient trees by finding and promoting examples with amazing stories to tell.

Singer and songwriter Dougie MacLean has offered his support to the campaign. I have attached some images of Dougie playing 'Farewell to Whisky' under the branches of the fiddle tree. You are free to use these to promote the vote in any way. (I couldn't get this pasted into this issue, TT editor).

Scotland is famous worldwide for many things, but two that stand out are its amazing natural wonders and the traditional music that forms a large part of our culture. Niel Gow's oak bridges these two worlds. I hope you can support our campaign and if you need any further information please do not hesitate to contact me.

A recent issue of The Hunter Valley Branch, Australia's Newsletter, The Rant, recalled some views of Miss Milligan's visit to the branch some 40 years ago:

MISS MILLIGAN - from an editorial by Heinz Duewell, for The Rant, Dec. 1974

"And there is that wonderful tree that grows in Scotland with its branches and twigs and its leaves, you and I" that is Miss Milligan's description of the Royal Scottish Country dance Society. It is a tree of enormously beneficial powers as it stands for something of everlasting quality. It is completely noon-materialistic, it touches the human spirit and is part of it. As I sit here and watch the wind-whipped seas pounding the shore, one is reminded of the turbulence of the world today. A turbulence which, while often pretending to strive for good, expresses itself in horror, murder, war - testing human endurance to breaking point. How different the community united in its enjoyment of Scottish country Dancing! Here is something which takes us out of our selves and something we are sharing. This sharing is important, for it is a sharing that extends across the world and unites people from different nations. It opens doors of friendship in far-flung countries and as Miss Milligan says, it exerts a powerful stimulus for peace. Anyone who has travelled the world would readily appreciate this and a living demonstration is the annual family gathering at St. Andrews, better known as Summer School.

It has been an inspiration for many of us who were privileged to meet Miss Milligan on her recent first visit to the lands of the South. You might describe her as the apostle of Scottish Country dancing. She is that and more, and yet she is one of us. We are all equal in the best sense, an equality that elevates. Miss Milligan is exceedingly approachable and has a keen sense of humour. She spoke to us about the state of country dancing early this century and how she together with Mrs. Stewart of Fasnacloich revived the ailing body that country dancing was. The story has been splendidly told many times and we are all aware of how much alive Scottish Country Dancing is today. The Golden Age of Scottish Country Dancing is now as Hugh Foss ventured to say in his last publication. We all know who it is due to and our hearts go out in thanks to Miss Milligan, and may her spirit of kindness, peace, and friendship last forever.

Article from The Rant, Dec, 1974 by Batty Gemza

She came, she saw, she conquered! Who else, but Mis Milligan! Numerically a D.O.L. (Dear Old Lady) but the similarity began and ended right there. Who can forget the sight of Miss M. in the center of the Assembly Hall at Cardiff High School, clapping out the beat for almost 100 children encircling her for step practice. Or the breathless hush of those children as she spoke and reminisced. Could this vitality last?

Friday night at the Tech College Union the spell was cast once more as we listened to Miss M. Could there be more? Miss Milligan mounted the stairs of the stage ("all the better to see you all"). The men were invited to look at their partners "with pleasure" and "roguish twinkle" and then we were on our way to learning two dances. Perhaps we were not all brilliant at learning them but there was great pleasure from trying, encouraged all the time by Miss Milligan clapping and calling the beat, exhorting all the while "ad astra" (to the stars). I for one will never make it to the stars, but feel quite certain that Miss Milligan could bring them down for me. May the powers that be continue to smile down on her.

Gordon Stott wrote about her trip in Australia including her engagements in Sydney:

......And so we say farewell, while Miss Milligan flew off to fresh fields - Adelaide, Canberra, Melbourne and Perth. One small old lady last seen heading westward to South Africa, thence to snow-covered Scotland, leaving us feeling pleased, exhausted and slightly stunned. Perhaps she is a cross between a sergeant -major and a purple people eater; perhaps she does reduce strong men to quivering blobs of jelly, but she is a lady to her toe nails (fully extended and turned out), and a wonderful ambassadress for her country and for Scottish dancing. May her shadow never grow shorter. Some may find the Address to the Haggis by Robert Burns somewhat confusing. Understandable as it is written in the Scots language. This translation come via the New York branch's Archivist, Anne Lowenthal.

AULD LANG SYNE

This was published in their newsletter, following a NY Branch Burns Night some years ago. The occasion involved Walter Paton, the lovely hostesses Amilda Hadden and many volunteers who served the refreshments that gave the evening a real "Punch". Doris Weller provided backup with records in the event that the tapes went awry. Freddy Sverdlove devised the program. Since it can be difficult to catch the words of Burns "Address to the Haggis" at the Supper, here they are for you in a standard English translation from the Scots, thanks to the website of the Robert Burns World Foundation.

Fair Full your honest, jolly face, Great Chieftain of the sausage race! Above them all you take your place. Stomach, tripe, or intestines; Well are you worthy of a grace As long as my arm.

The groaning trencher there you fill, Your buttocks like a distant hill, Your pin would help to mend a mill In time of need, While through your pores as the dews distill Like amber bead.

His knife see rustic Labour wipe, And cut you up with ready slight, Trenching your gushing entrails bright, Like any ditch; And then, O what a glorious sight, Warm steaming, rich!

Then spoon for spoon, they stretch and strive;

Devil take the hindmost, on they drive. Till all their well swollen bellies by-and-by Ar bent like drums;

Then old Master of the house, most like to burst,

'The grace!' hums.

Is there that over his French ragout, Or olio that would sicken a sow, Or fricassee would make her throw-up With perfect disgust Looks down with sneering, scornful view On such a dinner?

Poor devil! I see him over his trash, As feeble as a withered rush, His thin legs a good whip-lash, His fist a nut; Through bloody flood or field to dash, Oh how unfit.

But take note of the haggis fed Scot The trembling earth resounds his tread Clasped in his large fist a blade He'll make it whistle And legs and arms and heads he will cut off Like the tops of thistles.

You powers who make mankind your care And dish them out their meals Old Scotland wants no watery food That splashes in dishes But if you wish her grateful prayer Give her a haggis!

ELIZABETH MACLACHLAN

Have you ever wondered about the person who put together the dances in The Border Book?

I have, and also questioned why she is never mentioned by the RSCDS. A brief piece in the newsletter of the London (UK) Branch - *The Reel*, May- Aug, 2010, shed some light on the lady, and shows how important archives are in learning about past events and individuals.

The RSCDS archivist, Marilyn Healy had found a rather poor photo and a report from the March 1936 issue of the *London Daily Sketch*. The photo is of an intelligent looking elderly lady, with a black lace covering for her hair. The article reads:

"Still an expert dancer at 79, a London woman is the leading figure in a new movement to revive Scottish folk dancing in London and the south of England. She is Mrs. Elizabeth Maclachlan, of St.Martin's Lane, W.C., one of the best-known figures in the folk dancing world for more than half a century.

Her plan is to organize teams of Scottish folk dancers to attend festivals throughout the country. Commenting on the fact that the English people seem to be cleverer at Scottish folk dancing than the Scots themselves, Mrs. Maclachlan observed that it is largely because the people of the south are more interested.

"I can do a Cumberland Reel with the best," she told me, "It is all a matter of keeping at it, and I don't think I have ever given up dancing for any length of time since I was a young girl." She is a qualified doctor, and for years lived in Harley Street. It is believed that relations with Miss Milligan were not the most cordial!"
