## **Notes from the Executive Committee**

As part of their entertainment they are repeating last year's popular program with a Scottish Country Dance workshop by Jeanetta McCall in the afternoon and Parcel of Rogues musicians Susie Petrov and Dan Houghton for evening music and dancing.

## **Scottish Country Dancing - What is it?**

**Jeanetta** writes that it is a form of dance which is appealing to any age as it provides much social contact as well as being good for one's physical and mental well being. Don't let the footwork deter you. If you can walk to be in the right place at the right time you will be fine. It could be that you might like to try this at some time but feel that you are alone with no partner. This does not matter as everyone is encouraged to mix with everyone else. In all my sixty-eight years of dancing, I have been to a function once with a partner.

The dance goes back at least three hundred and fifty years but during the 1920s was in decline. Two women, Jean Milligan and Ysobel Stewart, decided to teach, standardize, and record the dances of their forebears. Since that time many new figures and dances have emerged, particularly after WWII. One cannot dance without music and this is of great importance to the enjoyment of SCD. Traditionally the major instrument was the fiddle, but was superseded by the accordian in the early 20th century. Now you have SCD bands which use both of these instruments and others. So listen to the variety of reels, jigs, and strathspeys, and enjoy.

## MAKING EFFECTIVE USE OF A CLASS MUSICIAN - by Don Bartlett

The advantages of a class musician over records are;

- · a faster-paced and more interesting class
- the possibility of doing unusual things such as "coming in" and altering the tempo
- the livelier sound of live music
- use of original tunes and the right amount of music and the right bars

The musician should be an extension of the teacher, in the sense that the teacher should not have to use teaching time to give anything but the simplest instructions to the musician. To achieve this the teacher must anticipate his/her musical need and speak to the musician before getting the dancers on the floor. Possible subjects to cover are:

- name of the dance
- reel, strathspey, jig or waltz
- lesson plan
- rhythm changes
- number of bars
- · any special requirements
- tempo wanted

Remember that the musician may need some time to get the correct music and to plan what to play.

A teacher must understand music beats as well as dance rhythms. Waltzes have 3 beats to the bar, reels and jigs have 2, and strathspeys have 4. Because reels and jigs both have 2 beats to the bar, dancers can dance the same steps to the two rhythms; however, because the rhythms are different, the steps are executed slightly differently. This is why skip-change is usually taught to jig (6/8) music, and pas de basque is usually taught to reel (2/4 or 2/2) music. (Can you explain the choice?)

When a teacher is walking steps, or moving to a count and wants to bring the music in, the correct tempo, music beats and rhythm must be the teacher's voice and/or motions. The musician will pick up the desired tempo from the teacher. The area of most difficulty for many teachers is distinguishing between reel and jig rhythms. Some pointers:

- remember one jig (e.g. New Rigged Ship) and one reel (e.g. The White Cockade)
- don't try to bring in jig music while counting "hop step together step replace "together" by "close"
- when counting slowly it is more natural and therefore easier to count in reel time

To bring the music in, either ask the musician to come in on his own initiative, or give "ready, and." Be careful that the music starts for the step with the right foot, especially if you are "mirror teaching."

## THE SCOTS' CHARITABLE SOCIETY

The Scots' Charitable Society is a charitable organization founded by Scotsmen to come to the aid of Scottish people in need. Founded in 1657, it is the oldest charitable organization in the Western Hemisphere still operating.

On January 6, 1657 twenty-eight "Scottish Men" signed the Laws, Rules and Orders of the Poor Boxes Society in Boston and formed the Scots' Charitable Society. It is likely that the Society was founded in part to assist a specific group of Scots - those captured by Oliver Cromwell at the Battle of Dunbar in 1650, and those captured exactly one year later at the Battle of Worcester. Prisoners from both battles were sold as indentured servants to the London Company of Undertakers, a venture capital group in London investing in the first successful iron works in the American colonies. Bound to the iron works at Lynn (now Saugus) in Massachusetts, most of the indentured Scots were required to complete seven years of labor for the company. It seems the indentures began to expire between 1655 and 1657.

Its original charitable work was to relieve the effects of ill-health, those who were destitute, and aid to widows and children when the breadwinner was unable to work. The organization came to the aid of many native Scots away from their homeland as well as Americans of Scottish descent. Today this purpose has changed to the granting of scholarships for undergraduate college education, and in 2014 they gave out 77 such scholarships. A further activity was formed in 2013 when a cultural committee chaired by Jeremy Bell was formed with the mission to preserve all aspects of the Scottish culture, including the music, dance, food, literature and dress. They awarded their first-ever trophy for winners in the Disabled Games competition at Loon Mountain in 2013, and that will continue to be an annual award. Membership is still confined to men, with an active women's group working with the Society. ## What makes Scottish Country Dancing Scottish? by Marjorie McLaughlin

**TUNES**: In 1733 in London, John Walsh published "Caledonian Country Dances." But the book is called Caledonian because of current popularity of Scottish tunes, not because the dances were distinctly Scottish in their figures. Dances at the time were known by their tunes. The particular figures didn't make up the dance; the tune gave the dance its name and its character. Scottish tunes were very popular in England in the 1730s and became part of dance publications.

**FIGURES**: The figures "set and turn corners, reel of three" first appeared in Country dances in Scotland. It began to appear in English publications after 1780! The figure had been adapted from the native Highland Reels, which continued to be danced in the north of Scotland. Around 1800 the Highland Reel itself becomes fashionable in England when Thomas Wilson introduced it to polite society. But the reel of four from the Highland Reel never appears in English Country dancing (the closest figures are "chain for four" and "four changes of circular hey" - more like our modern rights and lefts).

The Reel of four is another distinctive Scottish addition to Country Dancing.

MUSIC TEMPI: Reels, jigs and hornpipes (English, Scottish and Irish) were used for most Country dance tunes during the 17th and 18th centuries. The "Strathspey Reel" appears first in the Menzies manuscript in Scotland in 1749 in the still-popular "The Montgomeries' Rant." At that time there was little difference in tempo between strathspeys and reels, but the fiddle form of the music was developing in Scotland during the 18th century. It was adapted musically to Highland Reels on the bagpipe and made its way as a dance step into Country dancing with the development of the fiddle form. Like the "set and turn corners" figure, it is a Scottish contribution to the development of Country dancing. Around 1780 English dance manuals began to talk about strathspey musical tempos, but the strathspey dance form we know today never became part of English Country dancing. This distinctive Scottish Country dance step and musical tempo was adapted from the native Highland Reels.

**HIGHLAND REELS**: The Reel as a dance made its way to England around 1800 in the publications of Thomas Wilson, but it never gained the same popularity as Country dances. But the Reel as a dance had its influence as part of the Scottish Country dance repertoire. The "Eightsome Reel" was a late 19th-century attempt to save the old Highland Reels.

**THE ATHOLL EIGHTSOME**: This dance was devised at Blair Castle by a group of young dancers - the ladies were the four beautiful daughters of the then Earl of Moncrieffe and it was based upon the dancers' memories of the Highland Reel. The formations were very much the same as we dance today. The publication "Blair Atholl Eightsome Reels" was dedicated to the Atholl Highlanders and arranged by Helen, Lady Forbes.

The cover has the Duke of Atholl's crest (a demi-savage holding a dirk and a key). Two Atholl Higherlanders in full dress, and the motto 'Furth Fortune & Fill the Fetters' arranged around a picture of Blair Castle. Published in Aberdeen by J. Marr, Wood & Co., 180 Union St. Price 2/-. As far as I can discern the publication date was in the 1870s. — *Evelyn Murray* 

## A review of "A Book of Perth Dances" - by Heinz Duewell

When a new book of dances appears and one opens it, this is equivalent to entering a garden composed of well-arranged beds. Some are well-arranged in familiar patterns, but then one meets with new patterns including ones which at first appear impossible to follow in a dance, and therein lies the challenge. How does one perform the new shapes? Sometimes there appears no solution. Have we reached the limit of our imagination? "A Book of Perth Dances" contains some such questions. When I received my copy from friends who are resident in Perth I was delighted. It was the thing I needed at that very moment. A problem with my right leg had made it impossible for me to dance – I had not given up and was looking forward to returning to dancing. Every week I attended classes, and was able to watch. I felt encouraged that sooner or later I would return to that activity and I would have a new book of dances to teach. The dances in the book present a great deal of variety.

"Oakbank's Tribute to Christian" – this 3-couple 32-bar jig includes half rights and lefts and half reels of 4. The combination of figures flow well which proved very popular with the class.

"The Blooms of Perth" – a 128-bar Strathspey-Reel medley in a square set features Schiehallion Reels, a half double ladies chain and a half double men's chain, which proves to be an interesting combination.

"Miss Macpherson of Scone" – is a 4-couple 32-bar strathspey in a 4-couple longwise set. It very cleverly combines reels of 4 across the dance, and half hands-across, ending in grand chain. The dance is dedicated to Miss Mary Macpherson, a long time teacher (1946-86) of Scone Country Dance Club.

The "Two Inch Race" devised by Roy Goldring is a 32-bar reel for 5 couples in a 5-couple longwise set. A series of diagrams is a great help in guiding one through the central pattern of the dance - which contains an interesting sequence of 2 bar passes and changes. Though it still leaves you to wonder - what is a "Two-Inch race"?\* It certainly is a fun dance.

"The Silver Walk" is a 64-bar square strathspey, exploiting half ladies and half men's chains in the design of the dance.

"The Vale of Atholl" – a 32-bar jig by Evelyn Murray, was first published in 1986 in the "New Atholl Collection" commemorating the bicentenary of Robert Burns' Highland Tour in 1787. It has been popular with us for all that time because of its pleasant combination of simple figures.

The Perth Book with its variety will give great pleasure for dancers and it will make them think. We still have to try out some of these dances, and we feel excited at the prospect. Be sure to also read the review of the accompanying CD Music for 12 Perth Dances by Elaine Arthur of the Canberra Branch in the *RSCDS Scottish Country Dancer*, April 2009.

[\* I wonder whether the title refers to the fact that the City of Perth can be described as lying along side the banks of the river Tay between the north and south Inches? Refer also to the RSCDS dance published in Book XI no. 4 *Inch of Perth*? I'd be interested if that thought is correct or not. – *The Tartan Times Editor*]
