#### MAKING EFFECTIVE USE OF A CLASS MUSICIAN - by Don Bartlett (continued from last issue)

When a teacher wants the music to start cold (i.e. without walking steps beforehand), it is important that the cue words be loud enough to let the musician know exactly when to start playing. There are many choices of cue words: "ready and," "go." "with the music, ready and," etc. Keep the following in mind:

- If you are varying the tempo or the rhythm, make it clear to the dancers and the musician what tempo and rhythm are wanted.
- "Ready and" is used for walking as well as for music; make it clear whether you do or do not want music.
- The dancers need two music beats to get ready to dance. When dancing to count, "ready and" provides two beats. When dancing to the music, "ready" is a warning, "and" followed by the lead note of the music provides the two beats. "Go" followed by the lead note provides two beats, just as "ready and" does for walking. However, this is a less common starting method.
- Don't bring music in for a short phrase. Multiples of 8 bars are always OK; 4-bar multiples may be a satisfactory phrase depending on the music; any sub-division of 4-bar phrases should almost always be counted.

To get the right number of bars of music a teacher should:

- · Ideally say the number of bars wanted, or otherwise -
- · Anticipate needs and speak to the musician in advance, or
- Ask for music for a particular figure, or
- Ask for music starting at a particular figure and continuing until stopped by a clap or a loud "thank you"
- Just start the music and coach the dancers loudly to keep the music going.

A wise teacher will expect, and if necessary ask for, the correct phrase of the correct tune for each figure of a dance. The music pattern is given in the RSCDS books with music. There is not much point in dancing to the right tune if you are dancing to the wrong part of it. Sometimes, however, a musician may feel that the tune chosen for the dance or the music pattern indicated is not appropriate. In this case the teacher should respect the judgement of the musician.

A teacher is responsible also for the tempo of the music played for dancing, although the musician's judgement is usually adequate and sometimes better .... But musicians have bad days and make mistakes, and teachers sometimes have valid reasons for wanting unusual tempos. Accordingly, if the tempo is not the one you want, ask the musician discreetly for a different tempo. (The tempo error is yours because you did not discuss tempo requirement in advance.) But beware: teachers are inclined to ask for the tempo they themselves would choose to dance to. This tempo may not be appropriate to the capabilities of the dancers in a festival or demonstration team. And tempos in class should usually be somewhat slower than social dance tempos in order to give the dancers time to place their feet and bodies correctly.

The Westminster (VT) Scottish Country Dance class regretfully announces the death of our longtime teacher, *Bernard McGrath*, FSA Scot, in February.

Bernie was born in Edinburgh in 1937, and began Scottish Country dancing in school there at the age of 6 or 7. He went on to enjoy many other forms of dance, and won ballroom dance competitions. When he met his future wife, Mollie, he turned his focus to Scottish Country Dance. Mollie likes to say she taught him all he knew.

After the couple settled in Westminster, VT, Bernie began teaching Scottish Country Dance locally. Over the years he started classes in Brattleboro, Westminster, Chester and Fairlee, VT, and in Keene, NH. The Westminster and Fairlee classes are still active, and the Keene class was active until recently. Bernie was very involved in Summer's End, a Scottish Country Dance weekend held in Hillsboro, NH, and Fairlee, VT, which brought in many expert teachers over the years. He organized dance demonstrations in many Vermont and New Hampshire venues, including area nursing homes.

A favorite moment: a little old lady once exclaimed, "You're so light on your feet!" Bernie replied, "Aye, for heavy people we are."

Bernie was very proud of his Scottish heritage, and with a little time could turn anybody into a Scot. He was a popular vendor at Loon Mountain, and put many people into kilts and dance shoes all over New England through his store, Heather and Thistle. He was a correct and elegant dancer, and an exuberant MC. He is very much missed by the Westminster class, which he taught for over thirty years. — *Jessie Haas* 

#### As Old as Time - a temple of the past in the Outer Hebrides

Standing tall against the relentless salt winds of the Atlantic Ocean on the exposed eastern coast of the Outer Hebridean island of Lewis are in the region of 50 standing stones of differing heights. In their midst is a small, chambered cairn. The stone circle and the north avenue are believed to have been built before 2000 BC, while the three single lines and the tomb were most probably added around 1500 BC.

Yet nobody knows how or why they came to be there or what they are for although there is no absence of debate on the subject. As with Stonehenge, 700 miles to the South in England, or the Ring of Brodgar 230 miles away on Orkney, the mystery of their being lingers on. Archeologists have revealed that a small settlement existed at Callanish until 800 BC, but thereafter heavy peat deposits smothered the stones. What became of the inhabitants is lost and it was only after a depth of almost 6 ft was cleared on the site around 1857, that the stones re-emerged in their full glory and the speculation began.

Was this some great out-of-doors temple erected for sacrificial pagan worship? Or more simply, a

giant chromometer or sun dial marking out the phases of the

lunar cycle? Images of long ago druid rituals flood the imagination. One story has us believe that back in the mists of time there were three giant islanders who refused to abandon the old religion and Christian missionary St. Kieran, in the best Greek Medusa tradition, turned them to stone. But that doesn't account for the remainder.

There is also an apocryphal association with a range of mountains 30 miles to the south where Lewis meets Harris and what is known locally as the Sleeping Maiden or Sleeping Lady. Viewed from a distance, these undulating, treeless hills form the silhouette of a horizontal woman, her hair flowing over her shoulders and into the landscape. On the summer solstice between June 22 and 23, it is said that the moon rises at her feet and travels along her body to her breasts, where it catapults into the heavens.

#### **Outlander** Series Will Return to Scotland

The filming of the Starz network's *Outlander* TV series, based on Diana Gabaldon's tremendously popular *Outlander* books, has been a boon to the Scottish economy — the largest inward investment ever by a movie or television project. Gabaldon's eight novels have sold more than 25 million copies worldwide.

#### In Praise of Country Dancing

[George Fogg discovered this article. It is an editorial from in The Guardian, <u>www.guardian.co.uk</u>, Friday 30 January, 2009. It was reprinted in the English Country Dance Society's Newsletter]

In these difficult times it is more important than ever to remember what makes for a happy life. Naturally work and financial security are important. But the top influences are community, exercise, listening to music and doing things in a group. These are the top four predictors of contentment.

Counterintuitively, perhaps, they are all found together in country dancing. It seems unimportant whether it is Scottish, Irish or English, line dancing or the polka, the effect of all that twirling with family and friends while responding to the music produces a sense of wellbeing hard to replicate in any other single activity. It may be at odds with other known attributes of country dancing – the quasi-martial atmosphere of barked commands, the withering look of your partner when you go up rather than down the line, the pipes at what seems unnecessarily close quarters, and other people jumping on your toes. Yet the cumulative impact defies the individual elements. Economists who have made a business of studying happiness, such as Richard Layard and Richard Easterlin, might point to the larger impact of cohesive, broadly equal societies – Scandinavia, Canada, Ireland and New Zealand show up most strongly on the happiness heat map – but those of us condemned to the miserylands of Britain know that, in a community hall near us, happiness awaits in the shape of friends and strangers, old and young, all ready to share in a common activity. It is quite pointless, except that we feel better afterwards.

From Montreal — April 1976 issue of The Scottish Dancer, editor Maurice Whitby:

DEAR PADDY: I am very confused, can you please help me?

My teacher keeps talking about something that I first thought was the Teachers' Sit-in, but now I think it is the Tea Position. I am too shy to ask what this means. I am afraid rhat I may get thrown out of class because I do not like Tea at all and always drink coffee except when I am drinking Scotch. I am quite happy drinking Coffee or Scotch in almost any position, one of which might be the Tea Position; does this matter? — CAFFEINE

DEAR CAFF: You are worrying needlessly, my dear. You do not have to like tea in order to enjoy Scottish Country Dancing; you can drink anything you want to in whatever position you enjoy most.

What your teacher is talking about is the T-position and it refers to the position of your feet halfway through each step; when you bring the instep of the back foot up against the heel of the front foot, they form a letter T.

Your teacher is right to emphasize this. A lot of dancers are lazy and ignore it. If you are sitting out a dance at the next Social, particularly a strathspey, watch the dancers' feet. Even in something as straightforward as "Down the middle and up" you will not see many T-positions; in a circle round and back, the feet often do not come together at all! So carry on drinking your coffee and Scotch, but do take a little time out to practise your T-position. Get used to the feel of your feet closing together and you will soon be doing it automatically without even thinking about it. — PADDY

DEAR PADDY: A friend who has been dancing for many years tells me that, in the old days, the sets for Scottish Country Dancig always used to form up in straight lines. Is this true or is she pulling my leg? — RIPLEY

DEAR RIPLEY: Believe it or not, your friend is telling the truth! Wandering or zig-zag lines always did exist in Montreal but only recently have they started to outnumber straight ones. — PADDY
