Royal Scottish Country Dance Society's Annual General Meeting & Weekend

The meeting was held at the Gannochy Trust Sports Complex in Perth, Scotland on November 7th. Jean Farrington, Cate Gray (also a Boston Branch H.Q. representative) and Evelyn Murray were the three delegates for the Branch (according to our membership numbers we are allowed five). The meeting progressed through the agenda in a somewhat hesitant progression, which was unusual. A new Treasurer was appointed and he gave his initial sense of the Society's finances. Again the Society spent more than it received, but as it had received several generous bequests, the excess was covered. At least that is what I understood to be the case. In other similar organizations I have been involved with, the budget is the controlling mechanism preventing overspending. The rule being "if not received, cannot be spent" - or reference Mr. Macawber! No budget for the next year was presented to the delegates although I understand there is one.

So the bad news for the overseas branches is that the annual dues are to be raised by £2 as of July 2016, despite some heavy hitting from delegates representing mostly these branches. The vote was 184 for, 145 against, with 2 abstentions. As we do not receive the same benefits as do those branches within Scotland the current process does not encourage branches to push membership in the RSCDS. In Boston we are required to send more than half of the subscription members pay the Branch to the RSCDS every year. This increase, at approximately \$3 per member will have to come from the subscription paid to Boston Branch. Thus reducing the money available to the Branch by this amount. The only visible benefit is the magazine for individuals. Of course there are hidden benefits, such as help in examining candidates for the teaching certificates, but these are a hard sell to the dancer who pays in addition to class fees, is also asked to join the Society through membership in the Branch. The Branch supports the classes by paying liability insurance and a music subsidy for one dance party each year, to all classes with a minimum of eight members. Class fees paid by dancers go to the individual classes paying for hall rental, live music, etc. and range from \$3 (Stow) to \$9 (Cambridge). As a branch we need to sort out the proceedure for proxy voting, as we lost two votes due to information being sent far too late for Exec to respond this past year.

Four Society Scrolls of Honour were presented to the following: Stuart Adams (a past chairman) John and Jennifer Kelly from San Francisco, and George Meikle, the Leader of the Lothian SCD Band.

On the previous evening there was a dance and following the AGM the Provost (mayor) of Perth's Reception, and then the Ball. Both the programme and the band were excellent, just the floor that is dreadful. It was good to meet old friends and make new ones. — *E.M.E. Murray*

The RSCDS has recently produced some very good and effective brochures. The first: **Enjoy dancing? love music? ... Try Scottish country dancing!** It is colourful, with minimum words, depending on the excellent photography to make the point. It's a pity that a way cannot be found to transmit such a brochure for use by branches around the world - with some small modifications that could be possible.

The second brochure contains information on two systems for help in teaching: **Education Programmes for Children and Young People** ... are you looking for a programme of Scottish dancing? For primary age students there is **Jigs and Reels.** The complete resource pack contains detailed instructions for 30 dances, working through early and second levels and party dances; two CDs containing the music for the lesson plans and a DVD with video footage to demonstrate the dances, as well as a voice-over of coaching words for some of the dances. Available from HQ cost is £50 (approx \$75-80)* plus shipping.

Dance Trad is for older students - ceilidh, country & creative. This is a programme for teachers of Scottish dancing for young people. Contains detailed instructions for 14 ceilidh and 16 Scottish country dances, 2 CDs and 2DVDs — the video footage includes illustrations of steps, formations and progressions. Cost is £55 (approx \$78-85)* plus shipping.

The rest of the brochure covers medal testing which is probably not of interest. However, they are well designed and eye-catching. * variation depends on the rate of exchange


Roberta reports that **Howard Lasnik** is home recovering from repairs to a perforated colon. We wish him a speedy recovery and back on the dance floor very soon.

An Original Dance

During this time of year sadly the classes can be on the small side, so the following dance devised by **Jean Farrington** is a helpful suggestion, as it needs only five dancers!

The Quincunx 32 bar reel for 5 people

Starting positions: Four people in a square, one person in the middle.



- 1-2 No. 5 and No. 1 advance for one, retire for one.
- No. 5 and No. 2 advance for one, retire for one.
- No. 5, No. 1, No. 2 right hands across, ending with No. 1 in middle position.
- 9-10 No. 1 and No. 4 advance for one, retire for one.
- 11-12 No. 1 and No. 3 advance for one, retire for one.
- No. 1, No. 3 and No. 4 right hands across, ending with No. 3 in middle position.
- 17-24 No. 3, No. 2 and No. 5 dance a reel, No. 3 giving left shoulder to No. 5 to begin.
- No. 3, No. 1 and No. 4 dance a reel, No. 3 giving right shoulder to No. 1 to begin.

No. 3 ends in the middle, ready to begin again.

In executing the right hands across and the reels, keep the shape of the triangle created by the three participants in the figure.

The Story behind the Dance: Ian Powrie's Farewell, by Kareen Kerman

Who was Ian Powrie, and why a farewell to Auchterarder? Ian was a fiddler, and his Ian Powrie Band are Scottish country dance music legends. A quote from a web site electricscotland.com places him as "... one of Scottish country dance music's best loved figures, with a band sound and fiddle style that are instantly recognisable as his own."

Born May 26, 1923, at Bridge of Cally, Perthshire, Scotland, John Powrie was onto music from the beginning. Forever known by the Gaelic equivalent, Ian, he was the oldest of five children, all of whom were somehow involved with music. A skilled player of the melodeon and leader of a dance band, Ian's dad William encouraged his son at an early age. Violin lessons began at age four, and he performed an ad for Beltona label records at aged five. Early tutoring steered him along classical lines, and his teachers forbade Ian to play Scottish music. His study aided in his mastery of his instrument furthered his technique. However, the pull of traditional music from spontaneous gatherings and ceilidhs proved too strong, and as a teenager he was playing in his dad's band.

After the family moved to Bankhead Farm near Forteviot, Ian quit school to become a full time "tractorman" and formed his own band. World War II interrupted both farm life and music, and in 1942 Ian volunteered for the RAF, receiving pilot training before being sent to Canada to complete training. He flew various types of aircraft until 1946. Returning to Scotland and the farm, Ian, with brother Bill, eventually took over and reformed his father's band, concentrating on a repertoire of half traditional and half modern music. Radio broadcasts and dance gigs were their forte. Wouldn't you know it! He met his future wife at a dance, and Leila Mailer became Mrs. Ian Powrie in 1951.

Although seemingly tied to radio, his success gained him renown, and he continued to surround himself with outstanding musicians. The great break came when they were introduced to recording manager George Martin, the fifth Beatle. A test recording was made, and "Bothy Ballads for the Gay Gordons" became a best seller for the band. Big name Andy Stewart became linked with Ian as the medium shifted to television in the early 1960s, and Powrie's Band performed on the show White Heather Club in over 80 performances. "This gave them the status of best band in the land." The band toured the world and played full summer seasons in Scotland's theatres. Toss in a concert at Balmoral Castle for Her Majesty the Queen and several London performances, and the circuit was complete. His busiest year was 1962, and the very next year he accompanied Andy Stewart to Australia and New Zealand.

In the midst of all this fame, however, Ian did not forget his roots and purchased a farm near Auchterarder. This remained the family home until 1966, when, after a tour of Australia, he announced plans to emigrate there. West Kirkton Farm was sold, cases packed, a final LP recorded, and farewell concerts performed. As a tribute to Ian an his music, Bill Hamilton devised the 128-bar jig we enjoy dancing. This lively dance reminds us of the whirlwind of activities that Ian and his band must have engaged in every time there was dance music needed. "While living Down Under Powrie was in great demand as both a fiddler and competition judge."

Ian and Leila returned to Scotland in 1984 and resettled near Auchterarder. From here he worked on variety shows, traveled to North America – both Canada and the US, and made a CD. After 15 years, the family emigrated again to Australia. They were living in "Perth Down Under" when he died in 2011.

Remembered as a great family man with an immense love for life, he had a way of making everything fresh and new. "The music he created over 60 years continues to be enjoyed the world over, no doubt due ... to the philosophy passed down from Powrie's father to his superbly talented son 'It's not what you play, it's how you play it." We also, no doubt, will long remember the jig that bears his name and the legend of a man tied to Scottish country dance and Scottish country dance music. Bletchley Park and Hugh Foss

The home of British code breaking during WWII was rescued from demolition and has been renovated into a place to visit, with the usual amenities. It is situated just outside London, and may be reached by both train and bus as well as by car. It is fascinating to see the conditions under which the workers toiled on often very seemingly mundane tasks. They were often cold, worked in three shifts, midnight to 8 am, 8 am to 4 pm and 4 pm to midnight, without the understanding we now have of the toll shift working can have on the human body and mental fatique. Also the fact that most did not have any idea how the work they did fitted into the whole. However, their work shortened the war by two years, thus saving many lives. As we know everyone who worked there signed the Secrets Act and following the war could not tell anyone, even closest family members about the work they did, until gradually from 1970 onwards the information leaked out.

One of the major problems during this time was finding people who were conversant in other languages such as German and Japanese. One of the leaders in the Code breaking efforts was Scottish country dance devisor **Hugh Foss**. It turns out that he had been brought up in Japan as his parents were working there. He was a brilliant mathematician and as a consequence he became head of the Japanese section at Bletchley.

Now you can go into the Library at the Mansion, pull up his name and follow his track record. Which I found a fascinating thing to do this past October upon visiting Bletchley Park together with Jean Farrington. — *E.M.E. Murray*
