#### **Tuolumne Tournee**

*Tuolumne Tournee* is a Strathspey devised by Shirley Saturensky, an Orange County SCD teacher with music composed for it by Muriel Johnstone. It was devised while several SCDancers were staying at the Tuolumne Meadows Lodge in Yosemite National Park in 1994, and the twisting and turnings of the hiking trails led to the suggestion to devise a dance dedicated to this beautiful location. Anyone who has been watching the re-run of Ken Burns' "National Parks" will appreciate the description above. The 149-mile Tuolumne River (pron. TWAW/l'-mee) rises in and flows through the rugged countryside of California's Sierra Nevada, crossing the Yosemite National Park from east to west. Before leaving the park the river is dammed by the O'Shaughnessy Dam, creating the Hetch Hetchy Reservoir. This damming was done despite years of protests led by Scottish naturalist John Muir in the early1900s to provide water for San Francisco.

The Los Angeles Branch included "Tuolumne Tournee" in their book *Celebrating Fifty Years* of 25 dances newly devised and/or collected together for their publication.

Real spirit and liveliness come from within the dancer, and quick music often ruins much of the pleasure of dancing, because it is liable to turn the dance into something of a riot. To dance well one needs time to think of what is going next, and time to use all the bars of music given for each formation."



#### What's in a Name? The Countess of Dunmore's Reel

It's quite a rare occasion when I get to write a piece about a dance devised by one of our very own. This is one of those infrequent events, the dance having been created by none other than Deirdre McCuish Bark, well-known to many of us, and the current Chair of the RSCDS Toronto Association.

Other than Deirdre, did anyone else know who the Countess of Dunmore was? And Deirdre's interest in her – what was that all about? Then, I remembered Deirdre telling *Set & Link* readers recently about her trip

with hubby Keith to visit family on the Hebridean island of Harris (which is not to forget Lewis, the northern half). That's Deirdre's family of course, the MacCuishes. Keith himself hails from the English county of Lincolnshire, which is perhaps better known in some quarters for its poachers — but I digress, and that is a story for another time.

With a lead like that, however, it didn't take me long to find a connection with both the Countess of Dunmore and the internationally known key product of the isle of Harris, which is of course Harris Tweed, a rough, closely woven woollen fabric. Incidentally, Dunmore itself is quite a small Scottish community far from the Hebrides, located between Falkirk and Stirling.

Born to an English peer and his Russian wife in 1814, Lady Catherine Herbert was married at the age of 22 to Alexander Murray, who in turn ultimately inherited the title Earl of Dunmore. After 11 years of marriage, Alexander died. Among other holdings, Catherine Murray, now Countess of Dunmore, inherited 150,000 acres in Harris. And as those who are familiar with the British aristocracy also may know, the wife of an Earl usually takes the courtesy title of Countess. Anne Damas

Catherine, the now-widowed Countess, decided to take a strong interest in the Harris Tweed industry, which in the 1840s was somewhat in the doldrums. To overcome this situation, she

recognized that some revolutionary changes were necessary to combat the competition that had sprung up between the spinning and weaving of Harris Tweed, which was all done by hand, and the rapid growth of machine-made cloth.

She was so successful in this endeavour that sales burgeoned and Harris Tweed was well on the way to international acclaim. Enough about the Countess' history, what about the dance?

I must admit that the first time I saw it being performed I thought that I was looking at *Linnea's Strathspey* being danced in reel tempo. I have since learned that I was looking at a progression common to both dances called, somewhat quaintly in my view, a chaperoned promenade chain. Chaperoned? No, one does not need to have one's mother-in-law in attendance, but I hope that I got the name of that progression right. Whatever, I have indeed danced it a time or two at this point, without embarrassment. It is a very satisfying progression to achieve competently when you have your wits about you.

Well done, Deirdre! The RSCDS saw fit to include your *Countess of Dunmore's Reel* in its relatively new *Book 49*. We Toronto-area dancers should be very proud of your accomplishment in devising this interesting dance.

#### What About Other Dances Related to Atholl and Murray?

Barry Pipes' article on the new dance, *The Countess of Dunmore's Reel*, reminded me that there are other dances that belong in this group, some old and some new. The family name of Dunmore is Murray, similarly for the Earls of Mansfield. The popular dance in Scotland, *The Earl of Mansfield* (a 48-bar reel) published by the Society as a leaflet, was devised by John Drewry in 1980. John inscribed it to William, Earl of Mansfield, President of the Royal Scottish Dance Society at the time. The Earl served as President for many years, and recently passed away at his home near the Palace of Scone, the Mansfield ancestral home since the time of James the VI and I.

Other family names are recognized and published in the Society Books 27 and 11 respectively with the two dances *Murray of Lintrose*, devised by John Bowie of Perth, 1784, and *Miss Murray of Ochtertyre*, also by John Bowie, 1798. The Ochtertyre family used to reside near Crieff. In the era of patrons being necessary in order to survive in the music and dance environment no doubt he was acknowledging the families by naming dances after family members.

From slightly earlier we have a strathspey, *The Duchess of Atholl's Slipper*, written around 1770-75, but there is no hint of the story behind her slipper! The recommended tune in RSCDS Book 9 is of the same name and it is noted that it was collected in the Border country. *The Duke of Atholl's Reel* (a jig) is ascribed to Skillern, 1776. The Society published it in Book 16.

During the second half of the 18th century the famous fiddler, Niel Gow, was fiddler to five Dukes of Atholl. This meant that any time guests were entertained by the Atholl family either in Dunkeld or at Blair Castle, Gow would be asked to come and provide entertainment either during dinner or frequently to lead dancing in the evening. We do know that two daughters of the family danced for the visit of Robert Burns and his school teacher friend at the Castle in 1787. Niel Gow was born in Inver, a tiny village near Dunkeld, and with his musical sons enjoyed the patronage of the Murray family during his and their life times. Today visitors to Blair Castle can see the portrait of Gow painted by Sir Henry Raeburn hanging in the ballroom, together with his fiddle which rests in a display case. Niel is remembered in the dance *Niel Gow's Farewell to Whisky*, in book 34, which was collected in Canada and made available to the Society by Miss Jenny MacLachlan. The music selected is from the tune of the same name, composed by Niel and published in his Fifth Collection, 1809. Following along these traditional lines, Ron Gonnella composed the tune *The Duke of Atholl's Jig* which was "dedicated with gracious permission to George Iain Murray, 10th Duke of Atholl." It was first played and presented to His Grace at a dinner held at the Atholl Arms, 25th May, 1985. I devised the dance *The Vale of Atholl* to this tune which was first danced at this dinner, sponsored by both the Scottish Murray Clan Society and the North American Society.

This was following in the path of *The Braes of Atholl* which was originally published in Walsh's Country Dances, 1731. Danced to the tune of the same name, it is quite a complicated dance for this period. The Society published it in Book 8. The last dance is *Lady Jean Murray's Rant* published by Rutherford, 1749-1756, and danced to the strathspey *Atholl House*. Lady Jean was the elder daughter of James, second Duke of Atholl. Born in 1730, following the last Jacobite Rising and the Battle of Culloden, she met and married John, Earl of Crawford, in 1747 and, sadly, died in the same year.

In addition there are a good number of dances with titles reflecting this area of Perthshire.



#### Another Story Behind a Dance – John Drewry's Finnan Haddies

Finnan haddie. Hmmmm ... Where did I hear that before? ..... baked finnan haddie was a staple for winter dinners in my childhood. Curious about the name I asked my dad – a native of New Hampshire and really knowledgeable about many things. His answer satisfied me, and I continued to enjoy this treat.

Of course, finnan haddie is smoked haddock. It originated in the former fishing village of Findon, Aberdeenshire, pronunciation most likely shortened to "finnan." As with many local traditions, there are alternative claims to fame, and finnan haddie is no exception. Some attribute the origin of this delicacy to a corruption of the name of the village of Findhorn on the River Findhorn in Moray. This friendly rivalry dates from the 18th century although the Oxford English Dictionary notes "it may have been a popular dish in Aberdeenshire since as early as the 1640s."

Whatever the exact place and/or date of its origin, finnan haddie has been known for a long time, at least in Scotland. The fisher folk used the "cold-smoking" process, employing a green wood and peat method characteristic of that northeast region. This compares with the fish that was smoked for preservation, which became tough when exposed to the heavy smoke. Conversely, the locally produced fish had a finer and a more delicate flavor. These haddies were an immediate success, and many recipe variations have developed since the late 19th century. It seems that the villagers and those using this product on a regular basis hit on something that could be more widely marketed. London, perhaps? Indeed, James Boswell\* wrote that Scottish smoked fish could be obtained in that city.

Smoked haddock also has a long association with two other well-established smoked fish dishes: cullen skink – a traditional fish soup, and the Arbroath smokie – whole fishes split, dried, and then smoked over a hardwood fire. Quite tasty, so I understand! Apparently, the transplanted Scots of New England and Maritime Canada brought their recipes and specialties as they emigrated, and finnan haddie found a new home, becoming popular with the fishing communities as well as others.

If there is a dance entitled *Finnan Haddies*, why not a song? Believe it or not, research turned up a link to YouTube and The Oregon Chorale singing *Finnan Haddie* by Vijay Singh. Zebrine Kuehn directs while accompanied by Eliot Grasso on tin whistle. This is the URL: <u>www.youtube.com/watch?v=55mxBvG80Fw</u>. Cole Porter also mentions it in a song, *My Heart Belongs to Daddie*. A 1942 Warner Brothers cartoon punned it with the title *Fin n' Catty*.

Since *Finnan Haddies* is a strathspey, we won't be smoking the dance floor to execute it. But we can really enjoy this John Drewry creation. It is quite a dance with some interesting movements and unique figures.

The dance is published in **The Bankhead Book, Part 4** (**1993-1994**). The tune is *Finnin' Haddies* from Kerr's *3rd Collection of Merry Melodies for the Violin*, tune 73, page 10. The dance directions are too long to publish here, but briefly the first 8 bars contain set, turn and circle. The next is an exercise in set and link. The next involves corner, pass and turn with promenades. The last 8 bars are tidying up so that all end correctly in the order 3, 1, 4, 2, with 4th and 2nd couples on the opposite side. The dance is for 4 couples in a 4-couple set starting with the 3rd and 4th couples on opposite sides.

#### Flowers of the Forest - Mary Brandon

It is with sadness to announce that **Mary Shoolbraid Brandon** died late night on March 10, just shy of her 91st birthday.

Born into a dancing family, she was the fourth generation dancing in Fife, Scotland, taking her teaching inspiration from her mother, Mamie. After receiving her teacher's certificate at St. Andrews, Mary moved to Vancouver, British Columbia, and became involved with teaching dancing to local children and dancing festivals for school children. Mary was an influence in the visit of Miss Milligan to Vancouver in 1963, who encouraged a branch to be formed. In 1964, the Vancouver branch was established, with Mary being one of the first committee members.

In 1966, Mary married David Brandon and moved to Los Angeles. David and she were still active in dancing in the Los Angeles Branch (which David assisted in establishing). They moved to Hawaii for David's work and established the Hawaii Branch. After David's retirement, they returned to Los Angeles and continued to be involved in local dancing. Mary tutored several classes locally and traveled to Japan to instruct their candidates.

In 1987, Mary received the RSCDS Scroll of Honour for contributions with the Vancouver, Los Angeles, and Hawaii Branches. She was later an RSCDS examiner, one of the first in North America.

Mary has two books of dancing, *Memories of Fife* and *Dances with a Difference*, including dances with original tunes by her musical brother, Murray Shoolbraid of Salt Spring Island, BC. Her most notable dances include *Mamie's Jig* (written for her dancing mother), *Sandy Butterly*, *Double Sixsome* and *The Balgeddie Reel* (a staple in the Southeast USA).

Mary retired from dancing and moved to Santa Barbara to enjoy the terrific sunsets. She is survived by her brother, sister-in-law, stepson and stepdaughter. [David died in 2002. – ed.] While you may not have known Mary, or even met her, her legacy of dancing has influenced generations of dancers and, for that, I know that I am personally thankful for all her contributions, great and small.



The photograph (undated) is of David Brandon, Helan Platt, Mayor Frank Fasi, Mary Brandon and a piper. Mayor Fasi was proclaiming the first-ever Scottish Games in Honolulu which Helan had organized. Helan and her daughter Sandra used to live in the Boston area, and moved to Hawaii where they met the Brandons. Mary taught SCD there for a number of years before moving back to the mainland. She taught at Pinewoods Scottish Sessions in the 70s.
