#### SDCEA is Here to Help -- and has been for Almost 30 Years

The SDCEA (Scottish Dance & Cultural Education Association of Boston) is available to help cover part of the cost of dance or music events, if that would make a difference to your being able to attend. It was formed back in 1987 to provide financial assistance to dancers and dance musicians, making it possible for them to participate in Scottish dance and music events.

The funds come from memorial donations to honor members of the Scottish dance community, from the proceeds from an annual fundraising dance, and from individual donations. Most of the funding is designated for Boston Branch members, though some funds are available for use by non-Branch participants.

Over its 28-year history, more than \$48,000 have been awarded to 182 individuals to participate in dance camps/weekends/workshops or to attend teacher or music training workshops. Historically, roughly 75% of the funds have gone to Pinewoods participants, 17% for teaching or music workshops, and the rest for balls and other events.

Flowers of the Forest — Donald John (Iain) Morrison Macfarlane 30 Sept 1925 – 24 April, 2016. Iain Macfarlane was one of the best Scottish Country Dance teachers and dancers. His phrasing was also exact and right on! He was born in Scalpay, Outer Hebrides, Scotland, and arrived in Canada with an extensive background in teaching Scottish country dance. The list of his achievements and positions held in both Hamilton and then the Toronto branches is breathtaking. In 1992 he was awarded the Society's Scroll of Honour. Iain was a native Gaelic speaker. He is remembered for his passion for Scottish dance, his practical creativity, and his generosity and ability to elevate the lives of those who knew him.

## From the not so long ago past! THE DEADLY EFFICIENCY OF THE SCOTS

[From a letter to the Montreal Star, March 27, 1976]

Take the average Englishman as he moves about the home he calls his castle. Watch him enjoying his breakfast marmalade (invented in Dundee) on toast. Or slipping on his national costume, a soiled raincoat (patented by Charles MacIntosh, a Glasgow chemist). Follow him out onto an English lane (surfaced by Charles MacAdam of Ayr), smoking an English cigarette (first manufactured in Britain by Robert Gloat of Perth). The English bus takes him to work on pneumatic tires invented by J.B. Dunlop of Dreshorm, The English train which ships him into town works on a principle devised by James Watt of Greenock. See him in his office answering his mail (the adhesive stamp was a Scottish invention).

At home his wife is preparing his national dish - the roast beef of old England (prime Aberdeen Angus); this sets his patriotic heart beating a little faster as he enters the dining room whistling a nationalistic air ("Ye Mariners of England" by Thomas Campbell of Glasgow), for roast beef is one of the revered institutions, like the Crown (which has rested on a Scottish forehead since 1603).

After dinner young Albert is packed off to the Boys Brigade (founded by a Scot), young Ted goes out to the Scouts (the Chief Scout is a Scot), while young Ethel plays on her bicycle (invented by MacMillan, a Dumfriesshire blacksmith). Mum is in the kitchen steeping the wash in bleach (a Scottish invention) while Dad listens to the news on television, invented by John Logie Baird of Helensburgh; on it he will hear all about the doings of the U.S. Navy (founded by John Paul Jones from Kirkbeam, Kirkcudbrightshire) and wonder idly whether the four minute early warning system will be much use to the U.S. (radar was invented by Sir R.A. Watson Watt of Brechin).

After the kids come home, Mum will return to the kitchen to fry fish (Finnan haddock from Aberdeen) and chips (from Ayrshire potatoes) while Dad supervises the homework; logarithms were invented by John Napier of Edinburgh, and English literature is stuffed with books like Treasure Island, written by a Scot, and Robinson Crusoe, based on the life of a Scot from Kinghorn, Fife. In desperation Dad will pick up the Bible; here at last is one book where he will not be reminded of the Scots. But he is wrong. The first man mentioned in is a Scot, James VI and I, who authorized the translation. It's hopeless.

There is nowhere an Englishman can turn to escape the deadly efficiency of the Scots. Even desperate measures are in vain: he could take a drink (but Scotland provides the best in the world); he could stick his head in the oven and end it all (but coal gas was invented by William Murdock of Ayrshire); it might be argued that, in that case, he could always take his rifle and blow out his brains, but even here is a difficulty - the breech-loading rifle was invented by a Scot. Anyway it wouldn't work: they would plunk him on the operating table, pump him full of penicillin (discovered by Sir A. Fleming of Darvel), give him an anesthetic (by courtesy of Sir James Simpson of Bathgate) and perform an operation (antiseptic surgery was pioneered at Glasgow's Royal Infirmary). The first thing he would hear would be the voice of a Scottish surgeon telling him he is safe, "safe as the Bank of England" (founded by William Paterson of Dumfries).

Comment: The above is clearly dated material from only 40 years ago! However with the variable results pending from Brexit one can only wonder how England would cope without Scotland.

#### TWO NOTABLE SCOTS

#### **Alexander Fleming**

Fleming was a poor Scottish farmer. One day he heard a cry for help coming from a nearby bog. He dropped his farm implements and ran to the bog. There, a terrified boy was mired to his waist in black muck. Farmer Fleming saved the boy from what could have been a slow and terrifying death.

The next day, a fancy carriage pulled up at the Scotsman's sparse surroundings. An elegantly dressed nobleman stepped out and introduced himself as the father of the boy Farmer Fleming had saved. The nobleman offered to pay the Scottish farmer but he refused payment for what he had done. At that moment, the farmer's son came to the door of the family home.

"Is that your son?" the nobleman asked. "Yes," the farmer replied proudly.

"I'll make you a deal," proclaimed the nobleman. "Let me provide for him with the level of education my own son will enjoy."

Farmer Fleming's son attended the best schools and graduated from St. Mary's Hospital Medical School in London and later became known throughout the world as Sir Alexander Fleming, the discoverer of penicillin.

Years later, the nobleman's son was stricken with pneumonia. What saved his life this time? Penicillin. The name of the nobleman was Lord Randolph Churchill. His son's name was Sir Winston Churchill.

#### **Hugh Foss**

Hugh Foss was the quintessential mathematician who is best known not for his Scottish dancing contributions but for his work as a code breaker.

Foss was born in 1902 in Japan where his father was a missionary. He joined the British Government Code and Cypher School in 1924 and there encountered the Enigma machine which was the basis of most military transmissions. In 1934 Foss and Strachey broke the Japanese Naval Attache's cipher. During WWII he became Head of the Japanese Naval Section at Bletchley Park. In 1943 the Japanese had developed an advanced model of the machine and Foss wrote a paper which was the key to cracking this code. He was sent to Washington where he assisted U.S. officials and contributed greatly to elucidating the code and the workings of the machine. The Allies were then able to read coded traffic between Berlin and Tokyo. In Washington Hugh's penchant for wearing sandals earned him the nickname "Lend Lease Jesus." Foss wrote nineteen or more publications on dancing. His writings cover the spectrum from *Notes on the Evolution of Scottish Country Dancing in Scotland* to *Sunday Writings*, a collection of poetry and tongue-in-cheek debates about the execution of certain dance figures and the nature of the RSCDS itself.

He did not devise new figures but used established ones in unconventional ways: the fugue, and the use of reels of 4 and half reels of 4 diagonally. This latter strategy led him to do a great deal of work on 5-couple sets. Once, at a ball, after the music had started and realizing that he was in a 5-couple set, the solution to uneven participation in a 5-couple set came to him: after the first time through the first couple slips to third placed dances a second round from this

place, while the top couple begins at the same time. He gave instructions and the set members immediately understood. This method works for any odd numbered set: imagine *The Reel of the 51st Division* danced by a 9-couple set!

A look at the directions of a typical Scottish Country dance leads one to recognize a series of algorithms, i.e. a series of mathematical procedures leading to the execution of a task which is characteristic of a computer program. Such a presentation evokes a ready resonance with left-brain dominant people – those analytical, deductive, linear thinking, having good spatial perception – science and math types. They tend to visualize formations easily and execute them well. Right-brain dominant people – the creative, intuitive, multitasking, parallel thinking people – supply the style and grace to dance movements. It is easy to argue that this fortuitous blend of talents goes a long way to account for the success and longevity of Scottish Country dancing.
