#### **Notes on Dance Titles and Music Titles**

Sometimes the dance titles and tune titles, although similar, are different. The Boston Highland Ball program lists the last dance as *Mrs MacLeod* (of Raasay). The title of the dance as it appears in the RSCDS Book 6 is *Mrs MacLeod of Raasay*. – The Ed.

The tune appears in older manuscripts variously as *Mrs MacLeod of Raasay*, *Mrs McLeod of Rasay*, *Miss McLeod's*, *Mrs Macleod of Raasay*, and many combinations of the above. The oldest appearance in my library is in *Niel Gow's 5th Collection* (1809), and the title is *Mrs McLeod of Rasay's Reel*, *an Original Isle of Sky Reel Communicated by Mr McLeod*. It is printed as a 16-bar reel. – The Format Ed.

## SABHAL MÒR OSTAIG on the Isle of Skye

What is Sabhal Mòr Ostaig? It is a College focussed on the education of Gaelic language speakers, those who would like to learn or need more learning in this language of Scotland. Courses on offer include full-time and part-time, undergraduate and postgraduate, distance learning courses and short courses. The College's short courses program has grown in popularity over the years, and each year nearly a thousand people of all ages and backgrounds come for instruction in Gaelic language & culture, Gaelic song, fiddle, accordion, photography, community-based courses and a range of other specialist subjects offered by a talented team of instructors. These 5-day courses are a great way to learn the language and enjoy a good music session or two. The College also offers short courses of two weeks during Easter and the summer months. They also run weekend courses and workshops both at Sabhal as well as in different communities across Scotland. Some new courses being added include flute & whistle with Hamish Napier, Fiddle with Ewen Henderson and Adam Sutherland, accordion with Mairearad Green, clarsach with Ingrid Henderson, Aspects of Highland Material Culture and 'A Seascape of Gaelic Song' with Margaret Stewart, Gaelic for beginners in the Quiraing Lodge with Muriel Fisher and for fluent speakers a Gaelic pronunciation course with Iain & Muriel Urquhart, and creative writing with Alison Lang. In the evenings there are ceilidhs, concerts, music sessions, conversation circles and workshops. People come from all over the world, attracted by this special place on Skye. #### FROM THE ARCHIVES:

# Jeannie Carmichael talks about how Scottish Country dancing started in Boston

[This was first published in The Tartan Times, January, 1967]

A few years ago at the request of Beverly and Alistair Duncan, Jeannie made some notes about the start of Scottish country dancing in Boston. We are thus fortunate in having in her own words the early history of its development. Jeannie wrote:

Pre-charter, pre-branch, we were a small group, sometimes not more than one set - one stormy night just five dancers and myself, but we carried on. It was John McDougall, Duncan Hay, and Fred Newcombe, who asked if I'd teach them Scottish country dancing. We met at 87 Beacon Street, (the Girl Scouts' office) every Monday early in 1948.

How did John McDougall, Duncan and Fred know about Scottish country dancing to ask me to teach them? They saw it when a group of Scots students at Harvard and Radcliffe danced for a party of the English Folk Dance Society as it was called then. How did the Scots get there? I had a telephone call from Mrs. Meade of the Student Center: "There are some Scots who wanted to dance The Eightsome Reel and other Scottish dances. If she got them together, would I run an evening for them?"

NEFFA demonstration 1949 – our first NEFFA demonstration. Dancers were Kay Jacobs, Helen Spaulding, Emily Hartman, Theora Morison, Ann O'Brien, John McDougall, Duncan Hay, Irvin Davis, and Fred Newcomb. Dances were (I think) Mrs. MacLeod, Moneymusk, & Scottish Reform. That night in the audience was a Mrs. MacDonald, who, at the end of the evening, came up to say, "I know who would be interested in what you are doing." Next day over the telephone a voice, then unknown, but by now very familiar to us all, – could he come to visit us? The following Monday, still at Beacon Street, came Mr. and Mrs. A. Cameron Steele. Before the end of the evening Alice Steele was among us dancing. Through Mr. Steele's good offices, we danced at his lodge first, then for the Scots Charitable, then at the Clan Sutherland Tartan Ball, then at the Worcester Pipe Band's dinner and ball, then regularly at the Clan Sutherland's Highland Games.

In the fall of 1949 after my visit to St. Andrews [the SCDS Summer School – ed.] we were recognized as the Boston Branch of the Scottish Country Dance Society (then not yet RSCDS). On Irvin Davis' advice, we became incorporated under the Commonwealth of the State of Massachusetts. It was April 1950 before we received the charter. Mr. Cronin, then Secretary of State for Massachusetts, wished to present it personally, so it took time to arrange a date when he could be present.

How we spread outside the State, and the first Pinewoods weekend: David Bridgham, who danced with us from the beginning, began talking about our dancing to Mary Ann Herman of Folk Dance House, New York. She wanted to see it, so at an English Weekend at Pinewoods a few of us – four couples – found a free floor at a non-scheduled time and danced for Mary Ann. From that came the invitation to run a Scottish workshop at Folk Dance House. The first weekend in March soon became the regular date for the Scottish workshop. Dancers from Albany and Schenectady visited these and so came an invitation to dance in the Albany district and this was the start of the up-state New York groups. With these and ourselves in Boston, we dared risk an all-Scottish weekend, and that weekend in 1954 was ever so successful, under the chairmanship of Charlie Campbell. We sent invitations to all addresses in the SCDS bulletin, and so came the Canadians. From then on most of you know the story.

### **Keep Your Brains by Dancing !!! Ros McKie**

It actually summarizes an article by Geoffrey Selling in a recent TACTALK where he highlights recent research that shows that dancing is the best activity to avoid dementia. ### Who ARE the Scots, what is so special about being of Scottish descent?

Perhaps the book *The Makers of Scotland* by Tim Clarkson might unravel some of the conundrum. Clarkson covers a thousand years of Scottish history, this account incorporates both historical and contemporary research into old theories and controversies. During the first millennium AD, the most northerly part of Britain evolved into the country known today as Scotland. The transition was a long process of social and political change driven by the ambitions of powerful warlords; tribal chiefs and Roman generals, at first, followed by dynamic warrior kings who campaigned far beyond their own borders. From Lothian to Orkney and from Fife to the Isle of Skye fierce battles were won and lost, but by AD 1000 a dynasty of Gaelic-speaking kings, the Picts, and Scots began to forge a single, unified nation which transcended enemies. This chronicle brings to life the great warrior kings of early Scotland. An interesting read.

### Wednesday, January 25th, 2017, is Robert Burns' Birthday

This date commemorates Scotland's bard's birthday and is usually celebrated on or around this date with a dinner and a speaker who proposes the toast to The Immortal Bard. Often a formal reply is given and various other toasts made, including one to The Lassies. Other entertainment usually follows, including dancing, singing and performances by musicians. Burns wrote many songs, adapting older songs or completely re-writing the words. The book that made him famous is the first edition of Robert Burns' poems *The Kilmarnock Edition* which was published in 1780 by John Wilson of Kilmarnock, under the title of *Poems: Chiefly in the Scottish Dialect*. It cost three shillings and the entire print run of 612 copies sold out within a month.

Favourite Scottish Country dances with Burns song titles are: The Lea Rig, Corn Rigs, Ha! Ha! The Wooin' O' It, Green Grow the Rashes, A Man's a Man for a' That, etc. These are all RSCDS-published dances. Then in J. Cosh's 22+2 we have The Lad o' Kyle. The list could grow longer, but it is obvious that his songs continue to live on in many forms.

# The National Museum of Scotland Immortalized in Lego

The imposing Victorian architecture of the National Museum of Scotland, with its great central hall rising the full height of the building, is a wonder of design and engineering. And to celebrate the building's 150th anniversary, an equally wondrous  $11^{1/2}$  - foot replica, made entirely of Lego blocks, was commissioned. The work, by renowned brick artist Warren Elmore and his team, used more than 90,000 bricks and represented 350 hours of work. "I think the most challenging part was building some of the artifacts and the sculpture gallery – for example the Tyrannosaurus and the Formula One car," said the artist. The display now has pride of place on Level 3 of the museum, next to the cafe, and will remain there for the foreseeable future. The museum is located on Chambers Street, Edinburgh and admission is free.
