Scottish Dancing at MIT by Robert McOwen

In February, 2017, Tullochgorum was asked to lead and play music for ceilidh dancing at a Burns Supper at MIT. The event was organized by an MIT student from Scotland, Craig Thorburn, who wanted to share some of his country's culture with his fellow students. He managed to get close to 100 students to attend; the price of admission was modest as it was subsided by the school. Before the dinner was served, Craig delivered the Address to a Haggis, and got friends to deliver the Toast to the Lassies and Toast to the Laddies. After the dinner, I got the dancing started with Strip the Willow, followed by other popular ceilidh dances. Nearly all the students got up to dance, and in between dances they did not sit down but anxiously waited for the next dance. The crowd was wildly enthusiastic about the whole evening!

Following upon this success, Craig decided to run another Burns Supper in 2018. Again he hired Tullochgorum to provide the music and ceilidh dancing instruction, and again he got close to 100 enthusiastic students to attend for another huge success. However, this would be Craig's last Burns Supper at MIT since he is graduating in May. Because there seemed to be enthusiasm for the dancing, I suggested that he arrange for a class in Scottish country dancing for MIT students sometime before graduation. So Craig organized an event for Friday, May 4, with me as instructor and Nora Smith and Beth Murray as musicians for the class. We got about 15 students, although some drifted in late and some left early, so it was a little challenging to get them through the dances.

It turns out that Craig is remaining in the US after graduating from MIT: in the Fall, he will be going to graduate school in Linguistics at the University of Maryland. When I told him that there is a SCD class on the U of M campus that is taught jointly by Howard Lasnik and Ellen Ternes, he did a double take. It turns out that Howard had just sent him an email the previous day about his academic advisor! Small world! So I suspect that we have not heard the last of Craig Thorburn.

You may have noticed in the recent *Scottish Country Dancer* from HQ amongst "The Sadly Missed" that *Mina Corson* had passed away. The stunning fact is that she was 102, as she was born in 1916 in Calgary, Alberta! Just shows what SCD can do for us. Not only did she devise the jig Miss Alllie Anderson for her great friend but she also devised the progression figure "The Knot." As she told the story to me, she was waiting in Waverley Station, Edinburgh, for the Glasgow train to arrive bearing Miss Milligan for a meeting in HQ to put together the three dances The Jubilee Jig, Miss Milligan's Strathspey and Mrs. Stewart of Fasnacloich which were issued to celebrate the RSCDS 60th. Miss Milligan had asked Mina to come up with a progression figure. So she scribbled on a sheet of paper – with the result that we dance at the end of Miss Milligan's Strathspey "The Knot." Mina came to Boston several times as candidate examiner.

Those long-time attendees at Pinewoods Scottish and English-Scottish Session will remember *Don May*, as he was a regular. News came via April issue of *The Montreal Dancer* that he died this past February at The Cambridge Residence in Pointe Claire. He was 91, and (their quote) "though he had lived many years in Canada, working for Pulp and Paper Canada and McGill University, he never lost his British accent, nor his love of Scottish country dance and fast sports cars."

From the same issue another people news is that *Tom Spiers* celebrated his 90th birthday on March 13th. He says being with young people keeps him young, specifically his grandchildren and great-grandchildren in Ottawa and BC.

### Pipe Major Gordon Webster

[From Lezlie Webster's Eulogy, April 4:]

Gordon was referred to as the "Wee Boy" by family members because he was the youngest and he was a wee little boy. Holding hands with family members as they took long walks when they visited the farm, looking much younger than his years when he first joined the Army, Gordon is fondly remembered as a gentle, shy boy by his brother and two sisters – David, Ina and Mary. His father took him for piping lessons to Torphican and Bathgate Pipe Band when he was 8. His father, David, loved to listen to Scottish music, especially pipe bands. Scottish Country Dance music on the radio would often announce "Let's have a Gay Gordons" and that is where the name Gordon came from.

Gordon's family were school teachers but he always said he went to the University of Life. The Scots Guards gave him purpose and camaraderie that lasted him a lifetime. From Boy Soldier, to rising up through the ranks in the Pipe Band until he became Pipe Major – Gordon was one of the youngest Pipe Majors in the Army and the only person to be Pipe Major of both 1st and 2nd Battalions. Touring and soldiering all over the world, he had many experiences, some of which are in a book that he wrote over the last couple of years and that Marielle is putting into order. Facebook is how he kept in touch with so many of these friends all over the world and we can't thank them enough for all their messages and reaching out to him these last few years and

then when he passed away.

His last job was Personal Piper to HM Queen Elizabeth – "the best boss I ever had," he used to say. They would chat every morning as he accompanied her to appointments. We were married just before he took this job on and our two children, Marielle and Campbell, were born in Windsor while we were living there. Retiring here to New Hampshire was a decision easily made. The NH Highland Games at Loon Mountain was where we met, thanks to Alasdair Fraser. We both loved the State and the Scottish community within. We got to work teaching and performing and raised our children who loved Scottish music as much as we did.

If you couldn't find Gordon somewhere you just listened for his big laugh. He went through life with a lighthearted attitude. He was kind to his pipe band members and loved to tell his stories. His deepest regret was his problem with alcohol. It screwed up a chunk of his life. About a month ago he said to me – I can't believe I did all that. That wasn't me. I'm so sorry. How can you ever forgive me? Well, I said, we just did. In a lifetime so full of amazing events and accomplishments, you goofed up for a few years ... that's all.

At Balmoral Castle, Gordon was responsible for teaching the staff Scottish Country dancing prior to the Ghillies Balls that the Queen attended. The Eightsome Reel was a favourite for many years. The Ghillies Ball is for the employees at Balmoral Castle to get dressed up and dance Scottish country dances and ceilidh dances with members of the royal family and their guests. It is held in the large ballroom at the Castle and a live band is brought in – usually accordion-based bands, such as John Carmichael.

[From Gordon's Book:] The afternoon before the Ghillies Ball at Balmoral, it was Brian McRae's job (Queens Piper before me that I was taking over from) to make sure the army guys knew how to do the Scottish Country dances. So we concentrated mostly on the Eightsome Reel that afternoon. It was the second Ball at Balmoral. So we played at the dinner and then down to the Ballroom. It was the Piper that chose the dancers to dance with the Queen and to call the dances. Before going on, I must remind you that in the practice session in the afternoon it was all men dancing with men.

Being the second ball of the season, the head keeper of Sandringham was up so he was the obvious choice to do the Grand March with the Queen. He flatly refused and Brian told the Queen the situation. She looked around the room and said to Brian "What about Webster." Brian replied "oh yes, he dances." So I ended up doing the Grand March and the Eightsome Reel with Her Majesty. Everything was going great guns until it was my turn to set to my partner and I inadvertently set to the Duke of Edinburgh. He laughed and pointed his finger to the right (the Queen) and I righted the mistake with much laughter from those around. I told him afterward about the problem of having to practice with all men and he laughed again.

### On Visiting Scotland – include the wildlife in your list of things to see!

Most people go to Scotland to see Edinburgh, Glasgow, and maybe Inverness and Aberdeen. These are the principal cities, and in-between are places of note for their scenery, or history. For example, Glencoe with its mountains. Just the place itself is impressive without adding on its historical connection with the unprovoked attack by the Campbell militia on a group of MacDonalds. That still resonates today almost as if it happened just yesterday. Then take a castle such as Blair Athol located at a strategic location between the Lowlands and the Highlands. Again its history relates to many aspects of Scottish history, including being attacked by Princes Charles' army in 1746 just prior to the Battle of Culloden by one of the owners, Lord George Murray. The reason was due to it being occupied by the opposing side at the time!

There is so much to see wherever you go, but do look out for some pretty interesting wildlife. The Scottish wildcat is very difficult to see in its natural habitat. It is also in danger due to cross-breeding with feral domestic cats from Lorne and Lochaber. There are four specific areas in the Highlands earmarked as 'purebred wildcat areas.' The population in the wild is thought to be around 100, but with thousands of feral cats in the Highlands interbreeding remains a large problem. There is a captive expansion activity to increase the numbers of pure wildcats. More info at www.scotlandwildcataction.org.

The sea eagle also known as the white-tailed eagle became extinct in Scotland in 1917. It was reintroduced to Rhum from Norway in 1975, and later to Wester Ross, A third release in Fife occurred in 2007, and the numbers are slowly rising. There are viewing stations in Scotland for the osprey at its nest. The idea is to encourage people's interest in this clever hunter of fish. One station is at the Loch of the Lowes. Golden eagles can be spotted up on high moorland, red kites are making a comeback especially in Dumfries and Galloway.

Red deer are ubiquitous – not difficult to spot a herd in the distance or even see a stag up close. There are discussions to re-introduce the Eurasian lynx to the UK – primarily to cull the expanding deer population. It was thought that the lynx had disappeared from the UK thousands of years ago, but a recent discovery of lynx bones in a cave in Sutherland provided a carbon date of 400 AD. Around the coast and other waterways look out for otters. They are shy animals but fascinating to watch if you are lucky to see a family at play. I turned off the A9 one afternoon to drive through the countryside to Blairgowrie and almost literally met with a barn owl flying low across the narrow road. A truly beautiful bird, which flies silently through the trees hunting for its favorite prey of voles. Beavers have been successfully re-introduced into Argyll and the forest near the Sound of Jura. As their well-known trait is to change the landscape to control flooding, etc. they may continue to be a success.

Off the coast are orca (killer whales) basking whales, and porpoises. The Moray Firth is a good place to see this last mammal as a family are frequent visitors to this area. It is possible to take a boat trip out into the Firth to get up close. There is some good news in the bird world in Scotland and also some not so good. Apparently farmers are doing a better job providing habitat and food sources for the field birds, but the upland and wading birds are not doing as well. Also sea birds are finding their sources of food diminishing probably due to global warming. This has particularly affected such birds as puffins, who fish at sea during the day and should come back to their nests with beaks full of small fish at dusk. From the mainland a visit to St. Abbs Head is as good a place as any to start looking at large congregations of sea birds. The Orkneys, the Shetlands and the inner and outer Hebrides are worth visiting for the wildlife as well as for their places of historical interest. – *E.M.* 



### **Cookies in the Canongate**

[First an article found in my archives submitted by Maurice Whitby, originally found in The Sunday Post, January 24, 1988: Haggis O' The World Unite! – Ed.]

Cookies in the Canongate by Martha Kolman

a 24 bar jig for 2 couples Tune: 350 degree F oven

8-15 minutes long depending on size

Bars Movements

- 1-4 First couple setting, cream 1 cup butter or margarine until fluffy, and cast off to 2nd place.
- 5-8 Right hands across once around, first couple picking up 3oz. cream cheese, and one cup sugar.
- 9-16 Down the middle and up (first couple), until the mixture is smooth and creamy.
- 17-24 Reel of four with first man and second lady passing left shoulders, to beat in one egg yolk,  $^{1}/_{2}$  teaspoon vanilla, and  $^{2}/_{2}$  cups of sifted all purpose flour.

Repeat to bottom of set, by dropping dough from spoon, putting through a cookie press, or chilling until firm, rolling, and cutting with cookie cutters.

Bake as described above.

### The Hair of the Dog

According to The Dictionary of Phrase and Fable (1898) "In Scotland it is a popular belief that a few hairs of the dog that bit you will prevent evil consequences. Applied to drinks, it means, if overnight you have indulged too freely, take a glass of the same wine in 24 hours to sooth the nerves."
