

#### Flowers of the Forest - Cal Howard

Calvin Ray Howard, a retired Electrical Engineer and Musician, passed away at the Life Care Center of Merrimack Valley on Thursday evening, August 16, 2018. The beloved husband of Irene (Spiegel) for 61 years, he was 85 years old.

Calvin was born in Greenfield. He was the son of the late Kenneth and Alice Howard. Calvin was raised in Bernardston and attended Mount Hermon, a prestigious all boys college preparatory school. After graduation Calvin earned his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in Electrical Engineering from Northeastern University. He also served his country in the United States Army from 1956 – 1958 achieving the rank of SP-4.

Cal had a passion for folk dancing and music. was while attending college in Boston that he met his future wife Irene Spiegel at a local dance. They married in 1956 and settled in Burlington in 1961. Cal worked as an Electrical Engineer for Sylvania which later became GTE and eventually Verizon. He retired in the mid 1970's and started a new career as a musician, which was always his passion.

Cal was a talented dancer and musician. He played the accordion, piano and stand up bass. He played music with various bands throughout

the years. He even traveled the world playing folk dance music in Canada, England and Poland where Calvin and his family spent 5 weeks. He shared his skills with his son Neil showing him how to tinker with cars, build bikes and tackle any type of project in the home. Cal will be remembered for his easy going and giving personality and his love of his family.

### Flowers of the Forest - Lou "Torf" Torfuson

Memories of Torf, by Mel Briscoe

It's hard to commit to specific memories, and even some good ones have gotten fuzzy with time. But any good story is worth embellishing, so here goes.....

Torf was, well, different. Not just his size and demeanor, but also his mind, his curiosity, his empathy, and his willingness to yield to impulse and live on the edge. I only really saw him maybe once a year, at Pinewoods, but it took only seconds to get back into the Torf-groove and continue whatever conversation and rapport we'd had a year earlier.

Three events and one interaction stand out in my mind; two of the events were ceilidh acts that have become classics and I've seen repeated by others over the years, but the originals were what I remember.

One ceilidh act was his rope trick: He came onto the stage pulling on a rope that extended out the door he'd entered through, and he kept backing across the stage pulling the rope, clearly struggling against some unseen force holding on to the not-visible other end of the rope. He backed out the door on the other side of the

stage, and the rope keep getting pulled and pulled, until the unseen end came into view, and there was Torf, holding on mightily but getting pulled inexorably across the stage, and out the other door. The stage started empty, ended empty, and was just the masterpiece of Torf and a rope.

The other memorable ceilidh act was four chairs and four volunteers who sat in the chairs that had been carefully arranged by Torf. I won't describe the details, but his showmanship was superb and his execution flawless. You've got to see someone do it sometime.

The interaction was his obsession one year with taking pictures of the full-sphere surrounding him, all around in the horizontal, and above and below too. This got converted into a set of prints that showed the full view of the world around him....innovative, ahead of its time, great fun, and not at all surprising from Torf.

But perhaps the classic Torf was one year at Pinewoods (1981?) when visiting teacher Bob Grant was having dinner on the raft in front of the camphouse (an auction item, of course). It so happened that two uniformed policemen had wandered into camp looking for some directions to somewhere or other, and Torf got them to take part in a practical joke he conceived on the spot. The game plan was to put a policeman in a

canoe, paddle him out to the raft, and ask for Bob's permit to be eating on the raft. Well, things got elaborated a bit, with the entire camp standing around watching and cheering, as the policeman asked for the permit, then (surely coached by Torf, but who really knows) pointing out that Bob appeared to have a foreign accent, and did he have his visa and passport and ID papers with him? As Bob gamely played along, there was a call from the Queen (a phone in the canoe) that Bob took and bowed as he spoke, and Torf managed to get the second policeman into a Torf-style bear hug on the dock, and kissed him. It all ended with the two policemen escaping, not entirely with all their dignity, and good fun was had by all. At least, that's the story as I remember it, and I'm telling it, so there it is!

From Ken Launie: It was definitely 1981 (my first year) that the famous dinner on the raft occurred. The pretty-good-natured cop was quite surprised when this oddly-dressed large man wearing big yellow wooden clogs turned to him and said loudly "You didn't buy protection!" then chased him to the car.

#### Dancing to Haydn, Beethoven, Burns and other Composers and Poets

The professional singer hired to give a recital of the songs of Robert Burns announced that since there was no evidence Burns had written any of the tunes to his songs, he, the singer, had composed and he would sing his own tunes to Burns' lyrics. And so we heard *Flow Gently Sweet Afton*, *The Lea Rig* etc. sung to entirely new melodies. This happened at a Burns Supper in L.A. As you might expect it was just not the same, for some of those original tunes attached to Burns' songs may have been composed by Haydn or Beethoven or another famous composer.

Many of the titles and tunes we dance to are from old Scottish songs possibly composed by such greats as Haydn, Beethoven, Carl Maria Von Weber, Ignatz Pleyel and others. From the late 1700s to the 1820s continental composers set hundreds of Scottish, Irish, and Welsh poems and songs to music. For example, Haydn, who had a special ear for Scottish sentiment, wrote over 400 compositions for Scottish publishers between 1791 and 1804, He wrote the beautiful tune we now associate with the song *The Birks of Invermay*. Originally composed as a song in 1733 by William Malloch, *The Birks of Invermay*, was one of those that found its way to Haydn who wrote the tune we dance to, although it is now listed as "Traditional."

All this came about because Scottish folk songs were popular in European society and these continental composers were paid well by Scottish publishers and collectors such as Thomson, Napier and Whyte. In fact, they were paid so well that Beethoven complained that writing melodies for songs was keeping him from serious composition. An interesting example of the popularity of Scottish songs at the time is the classically Scottish *Oh Gin I Were a Baron's Heir*. But it was written by an English music publisher in London who knew what would sell, and it was a big hit when released around the 1790s.

A sample of Beethoven's contribution to this genre can be seen on the internet under "Twenty-Five Scottish Songs (Beethoven)." It shows both the Scottish and German name of the song or poem, including the authors, like Burns, Scott, Hogg, Byron, Joanne Baillie and Anne Grant. Burns' song, *O Mary at Thy Window Be*, is listed as the folk song with its German name *Mariechen, Komm ans Fensterlein*. I once heard some typically old, slow, plodding, plaintive Scotch songs sung to a jazzed up snappy tempo which sounded great. It was a recording of Beethoven's treatment of Scottish songs sung by a tenor and soprano. Unfortunately, I have been unable to find a CD of that recording.

The Joseph Haydn Institute in Cologne and G. Henle in Munich have issued 491 Haydn arrangements of Scottish folksongs; 150 submitted by Napier, 213 by Thomson and 36 by Whyte. Lorna Anderson, Jamie McDougall and the Haydn Trio Eisenstadt have released a multi-CD set of about 100 Scottish songs with such well known titles as *The Birks of Aberfeldie*, *John Anderson My Jo*, *The Flowers of Edinburgh*, *Green Grow the Rashes O*, *Duncan Grey*, *The Lea Rig*, *Todlen Hame*, *The White Cockade*, *Maggie Lauder*, and *My heart's in the Highlands*.

I am still unsure how many original tunes were composed by Robert Burns. If he did write original music, then much could have been replaced by compositions from Europe. Of course many of his written works, his verses and poems are brilliantly original. Burns wrote the words to *Scots Wha Hae* and used the tune of an old Scottish drinking song, *Landlady Count the Lavin*. Similarly the tune to Francis Scott Keyes' *The Star Spangled Banner* is from an old English drinking song.

#### From the Archives: A Fling With Bobby Watson

The month of July 1963 marked an unique occasion for Boston SCDancers with the arrival of that well-known highland dancer – Bobby Watson. Bobby consented to join us in a series of events which fortuitously could be squeezed into less than three weeks. The events, all exciting, consisted of: (a) The Boston Arts Festival, July 2nd; (b) Bobby Watson's Highland Dance Workshop, July 6th; and (c) Pinewoods Weekend, July 19 - 21. It was Bob Smith who made the initial efforts in arrangements with Bobby. The Kendalls graciously lodged Bobby during his stay with us.

Our first impression of Bobby was at the Boston Arts Festival. Marianne Taylor had choreographed an exciting demo team dance program for the Scottish portion of this event. This was highlighted by a spectacular display of highland dancemanship by Bobby. As part of his performance, one can only look back with amazement as he simultaneously played the pipes and danced his own choreographed Celtic Suite.

Our next "affair" with Bobby was the Highland Dance Workshop, organized by yours truly. The Workshop was scheduled on Saturday, with a morning session of Men's Highland, afternoon session of Women's Highland, and an evening dance party. Bobby gave us a thorough workout during the day. The evening party provided another opportunity to see Bobby's "magic." The finale of Bobby's Boston visit was the Pinewoods weekend. Bobby presented classes in Men's and Women's Highland, and also entertained us with his dancing.

Bobby Watson's visit will always evoke fond memories of a superb highland dancer, artistic choreographer, tireless performer, and masterful entertainer. Those present for this rare experience will recall not only the aching feet and exhausted bodies, but more importantly the wonderful exposure to top-notch highland dancing.
