

Pinewoods ESC 2019 was a rousing success! With 126 total campers and staff, Pinewoods felt full but not bursting. Campers enjoyed the characteristic balance of English, Scottish and Contra dancing found in ESCape, many dancing one of those traditions for the first time.

Our tremendous luck with the weather was offset by a major power outage on Tuesday, the first full day of the session, that lasted from about 5 pm till 1:30 am. However, the dancing could not be stopped. with camp manager Carl Mastendrea and office manager Thom Yarnal collecting dozens of lanterns and flashlights to light C#. All three traditions that night were danced without calls as the band played acoustically, with some musicians taking to roaming around the dance floor with their instruments. As the dusk settled and the dance floor grew darker, the atmosphere turned mystical, reminding many of the special magic that Pinewoods has. So many campers have told us how special that night was and that there should be an acoustic dance next year, whether or not we lose power.

#### Boston Harbor Scottish Fiddle Week Wraps Up a 17-year Run

For one week in August each year since 2003, Thompson Island in Boston Harbor has been taken over by Scottish fiddle tunes. The Boston Harbor Scottish Fiddle School has assembled teachers including guests from Scotland and Cape Breton with eager students, including a large contingent of younger players. Classes, concerts, and jam sessions filled the days and far into the nights, and tunes taught there have become staples of the local Scottish repertoire. The island, which historically housed a "farm school" for Boston orphans, is currently run by Outward Bound, with a program of outdoor and ecological education in partnership with the Boston schools. It provided a unique setting for a fiddle camp, a 25-minute ferry ride away from downtown and with spectacular sunset views of the Boston skyline, which guests could also enjoy when they joined the campers on Visitors' Days. Originally the idea of Barbara McOwen, the event was organized and sponsored by the Folk Arts Center of New England, which supports so many dance and music events in the area. While 2019 was the last year for this Thompson Island event, we're hoping that Boston will continue to benefit from Scottish fiddle camps and musical energy for years to come.

#### **Flowers of the Forest** — **Gregor Trinkaus-Randall** – **A Tribute to His 45 Years of Dedication to Scottish Country Dancing**, by Lois New with Vickery Trinkaus-Randall

The Boston Branch recently lost another dedicated member, when Gregor Trinkaus-Randall passed away on August 16, 2019. Gregor was a stalwart advocate for maintaining the highest standards of Scottish Country dancing, and his influence lives on in the classes he helped establish, the teachers he coached and the dancers he inspired. This is a remembrance of how Gregor and his wife and best friend, Vickery, contributed to the dancing I have enjoyed over more than four decades.

Gregor and Vickery met in 1974 at a Scottish country dance party. Gregor had just started dancing, having been drawn in by his work colleague, Barbara Little, while Vickery started as a kid in the company of the Smiths, Morettis and many others at the Little home in Newton, MA. Gregor became an immediate convert, quickly focusing on the technique essential to meet the standards of the RSCDS. Gregor and Vickery married in May 1976 and biked several weeks in England and Scotland, ending in Edinburgh where they attended St Andrews and earned their preliminary Scottish Country Dance certificates. Then it was off to Madison, Wisconsin to work on Gregor's second Masters degree in Library Conservation and Vickery's Ph.D. in Neuroscience.

I met them at the Hogmanay in Concord, MA, on December 31, 1976. A mutual friend and my first Scottish dance teacher, Ray Scott, introduced us, gleefully announcing that we had all three just begun graduate



studies at the University of Wisconsin, Madison. Returning to Madison after the holidays was filled with new purpose as we had committed to start a Scottish Country Dance group in January. My roommate Ruthie was immediately bitten by the Scottish dancing bug and so the four of us started a vibrant and joyful class. We danced at the Student Union on Sunday nights, and the class was the highlight of our week. Our energy, enthusiasm and effervescence together with the clarity, precision and joy of Gregor and Vickery's teaching quickly attracted a strong following comprised primarily of graduate students and faculty. Undergraduates and a high school student contributed to the youthful energy of our group. Like many Scottish groups, romance bloomed, and my roomie married a

handsome mathematician which further cemented the family feeling that provided a foundation for our group.

We traveled many times to Minneapolis to dance with Ron Wallace at parties, perform with him at the annual Renaissance Fair and study with him prior to Gregor earning his full teaching certificate and Lois her prelim in 1981 while Vickery was back East completing her PhD. This was the end of our Madison sojourn, as we all moved East together for our new jobs, the Trinkaus-Randalls to Boston and me to Albany, NY. However, Mike and Norma Briggs, Chuck Snowdon, and Deb Nelson kept the flame alive and the Madison class grew to become the Madison Branch. Gregor and Vickery were featured as honored guests at various anniversaries, including the recent 40-year Madison Branch celebration.

Traveling together to the East Coast in May of 1981, we maintained our strong family tie. I quickly became a member of the Boston Branch as I joined Gregor and Vickery for every major event, and many weekends between. As I started to build a Scottish dance group in Albany, Gregor came often to teach, to encourage, and to uphold the RSCD standards. Together, Gregor, Vickery and I organized events and repeated our successful blend of technique and fun that established the Albany class the same way we built Madison. Barbara and Robert McOwen, and Ed Pearlman and Beth Murray, took turns supporting our fledgling group

with live music, while Evelyn Murray brought dance shoes and accoutrements needed by a budding dance group. The members of our Albany class began participating in Branch events and we became the western-most class of the Boston Branch. Over the years, the Trinkaus-Randall support, together with generous contributions by other members of the Branch, have ensured connection, continuity and inspiration for our group.

Gregor was a great one for initiating, organizing and following through. He loved to teach and to help people reach their best potential. Demanding, but understanding, he set standards and then facilitated dancers achieving them. He served in several capacities of the Boston Branch executive committee, taught regularly at Stow, championed the Ed Rawson scholarship program and taught workshops for Scottish Country dance

classes in many parts of the country. Many of you reading this will have experienced your own inspiration and growth as a result of his dedication to the art and perfection of Scottish Country dancing.

In 2014-15, Gregor, along with Andy Taylor-Blenis, taught the Boston Branch RSCDS Candidate Class, and helped many teacher candidates prepare for and pass their teaching certificates. It became one of those classes that bonded together and with their teachers. It meant many many hours of not only footwork but comportment,



individual analysis, taping, analysis and teaching and more analysis and thoughts about who danced best with whom for the examination. It is our next generation of dancers and teachers who will look to Gregor and Andy as their inspiration.

Fast forward to 2018, when Gregor taught a stellar workshop our Capital District (Albany, NY) Fall Frolic, while undergoing treatment. For those who danced with me at Pinewoods this past summer, Gregor was there on my shoulder the entire time. We planned the lessons together, in-person and by phone, and his dances were featured in my classes. His grace, vigor and joy are always in my mind when I dance and when I teach. The gifts he leaves for Scottish dancers will multiply across the years, radiating outward and onward through all those he befriended, taught, danced with and inspired.

Vickery would like everyone to join her and their family, at a Celebration of Life to be held on Saturday, October 5, 2019 at 2:00 PM at the Pompositticut Community Hall. The Community Center is located at 509 Great Road (Rte. 117) in Stow. It will represent the different facets of life. Children are welcome. There will be a reception following there.

#### Petronella

*[by Hugh Thurston; Note from the Editor:* In going through piles of paper I have come across some of Hugh Thurston's writing about Scottish dances. Hugh in the early 1960s lived in Boston and then moved to Vancouver, to teach at the University of British Columbia. There he published another newsletter called *The Thistle* for a number of years. Whilst here he was the original editor of *The Tartan Times*. Here are his thoughts about a very familiar dance.]

There was more than one dance of this name, the tune and "cutting the diamond" being common in each. The first occurrence in print of the tune is in 'The Cries of Edinburgh' to which are added Petronella and a favorite medley composed and arranged by Nathaniel Gow and performed at his annual ball on 14th March 1820.

Dances called Petronella (or rather Petronelle) first appeared in print in J.P. Boulogne's "The Ballroom" 1827. One was called an "English quadrille," one a "Hungarian waltz" and the third, the one we know, an "English Country dance" (about half the dances in the book are called English including also Triumph and about half Scottish). Wm. Smith, in his "Pocket Companion," 1831, called it Scottish; J. Thompson (whose "Ballroomm Guide" was published in Glasgow at about this date) agreed with Boulogne. But about now the country dance was dying out in the English ballroom, and those that survived, including Petronella, were inevitably regarded as Scottish.

Note added to the above: For modern dancers schooled in the disciplines of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society it may seem incredible that dances could be messed about like this. We are used to having every detail about a dance explained by teachers who themselves have been taught to teach that dance in a very precise and particular way. The printed instructions for the dance are easily available throughout the world and it is expected that the dance will be performed in exactly the same way in Auckland as in Aberdeen. Today we are also told a lot about the distinctive Scottish style of dance, so it is revealing to be reminded that the origins of traditional Scottish dances are intertwined with English and even Continental dances.
