From the Editor: John Salyards forwarded this to me, and I thought it might be of interest to those of you who knew Ron.

Ronald Jean McDougald, born March 5, 1939, lived 80 athletic years until his death on January 16, 2020. A lover of family, trees, running, and Scottish Country Dancing, he was born in the town of Crockett, Houston County, Texas. Moving 14 times while growing up, he graduated from high school in Redondo Beach, California. He went on to earn his undergraduate degree, on a full scholarship, from Dartmouth College and his

J.D. from Harvard Law School. After studying to become a CPA, Ron was a tax attorney until his gradual retirement. He raised a family in Lincoln, MA where he lived until his recent move to Cambridge, then Waltham for care.

Ron was an athlete who ran 27 marathons, including 17 Boston marathons, in addition to many road races and triathlons. He was an avid swimmer who regularly swam across nearby Walden Pond. He enjoyed tennis, kayaking, canoeing, cross country skiing, wilderness adventures, and other travel. Ron was highly inquisitive, playful, an avid reader, and a poet. He loved movies and he loved to laugh. He spent the last 29 years as an active member of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society of Boston. He also attended the Church of The Covenant. Ron's zest for life was infectious, and he will be missed by a large community of family and friends.

Ron leaves behind his beloved companion of 29 years, Joan Hill, of Cambridge, MA; his daughter, Ruthie Kinch, of Brooklyn, NY; his son, Douglas McDougald and his son-in-law, David Glauner, of Stow, MA; and his grandchildren, Olivia, Bella, and Savannah Kinch, of Brooklyn, NY. He is also survived by the mother of his children, Kathleen McDougald-Lee, his nephew David Sutton, many cousins, and the children and grandchildren of his companion. Ron will be interred in his family plot at the Doulass Cemetery, in Houston County Texas later this spring.

The Edge of the World

This is another contribution from Norm McCallum and originally printed in the Bulletin of the Orange County Branch – Ed.

What do the year 1937, a four-couple poussette and the Shetland running step have in common? That was the year they appeared together with Shetland fiddlers in the 1937 film *The Edge of the World* by British director Michael Powell. This was Powell's first full length movie which he shot entirely on Foula, a remote island 35 miles west of the Shetland Islands. Powell used the 300 or so inhabitants of Foula in many of the scenes in which he tells viewers about the struggles of the islanders to survive in an increasingly hostile environment caused by the exhausted soil and over-fishing. Powell would go on to produce and direct such classics as *The Red Shoes* with Moira Shearer, *Dark Narcissus* with Deborah Kerr, and the Corryvreckan movie, *I know Where I'm Going*.

Operating on a limited budget, Powell used the islanders in many of the scenes. One in particular shows the islanders celebrating the birth of a baby, island fiddlers are seen playing, while a four-couple set perform a four-couple poussette and use the Shetland Running Step throughout the dance. I remember Bob Patterson teaching a Shetland dance a number of years ago. As I recall, Bob explained the running step as the travelling step of the Shetlands. I wonder whether they have their own setting step? Interestingly the dogs of Foula had really short legs, which made me think of other small animals, the Shetland pony and the Sheltie, which of course is a small sheep dog.

A number of years ago Martin Scorsese discovered the films of Michael Powell and, realising he was a great director, went to England to meet him. Scorsese was shocked to find Powell living in obscurity and poverty. And brought him back to live with him in America. There he has promoted Powell's movies. So, if you want to see a four-couple poussette and the Shetland running step then check out *The Edge of the World*. It was shown on the TCM channel, and can be purchased from TCM classic movies.

What's in a Name – Wisp of Thistle

"Wha Daurs meddle wi me," roughly translated, is the motto of The Most Ancient and Most Noble Order of the Thistle. Actually on the Order's badge it says in Latin *"Nemo me impune lacessit"* (No one provokes me with impunity). Most Ancient and Most Noble notwithstanding, I think we would all agree that the rough Scots version has the most ominous tone. It is said that the importance of the thistle to Scotland goes back to the Battle of Largs in 1263. A few longboats of Norsemen landed there in the dead of night, trying to take advantage of sleeping clansmen in the vicinity. They crept ashore barefoot to hide their presence, but unfortunately, for them, tried to cross a field of thistles in the process. Now, the thistle is known for its vicious porcupine like spines and as such does not have any natural enemies amongst the flora and fauna of Scotland. A Norseman yelped in pain as he stepped on one of the thistles. This awakened the locals and the battle was formed. Having been "meddled with," so to speak, the Clansmen won the day, and the thistle became a symbol of Scotland's (dare I say it) prickliness, from that day on. Or so it is said.

How to segue from prickly spines to wisps? Well, thistles have them both, the wisps, being the feathery puffs that can float in the air like, for example, dandelion seeds. I am told that the late Queen Mother, herself a Scot, on once seeing a Strathspey being performed referred to the dancers being like 'a wisp of thistle.' This comment may not have escaped the attention of Nova Scotian RSCDS teacher, Patricia Kent, who devised the strathspey *Wisp of Thistle* that appeared in Book 37 in 1992.
