Sally passed away this summer. For a number of years she had been living in a Care Home in Vermont, so newer members to the Branch would not necessarily know her. The best way I can describe Sally is by repeating from the musical, that she was the "Hostess with the Mostest." Once she arrived on the scene she got involved with whatever was going on. If a dance party or a dance weekend was on the calendar, she would pack people into her bus (later car) and off she and her passengers would go to join in the fun and dancing. Or she was offering hospitality for dancers from other places to join in the events in Boston or Salem. This would be followed by an after party, of course.

Her many contributions include the

formation of the Salem class, member of the demonstration team, recipient of the prestigious RSCDS Scroll Award, centre of fun and highjinks at Pinewoods, encourager of newer dancers to join in and participate, member of several committees, member of the Executive Committee, providing hospitably for dancers from afar for the Highland Ball Weekend, etc.

Sally learned how to make kilts and a number of her kilts will be on the dance floor at any Branch event. She also designed the Wee Bluets tartan for the Salem class. She and Peter travelled to Scotland several times. She encouraged MaryEllen Scannell to teach and take her preliminary certificate so that she could help with the class.

My first recollection of Sally is the time that the Ball Brunch was held in her home before she split with her husband. After she split with him she moved to Exeter Street in Salem which is where most of us will remember her. She loved her garden and also her dogs. After her first one died she thereafter took on giving older rescued dogs of the breed a safe home for their retirement. At class the dog would often lie on the stage watching the activities. The dogs seemed to enjoy the dancing and music and were an inclusive part of Sally's life.

The photos that Barbara has put together are much better than my words. When she retired from the Scottish dancing she left a hole in the Branch's activities, Sally was a person who gave more than she took from life.

Blair Castle Eightsome Reel

Research into many subjects and particularly Scottish dancing has been a long-time pursuit, and the discovery of the printed copy the Blair Atholl Eightsome Reel in an Aberdeen library was one of the exciting highlights.


The Eightsome Reel was already known to have evolved at Blair Castle during an Atholl Gathering in the 1870's and danced there for the first time, but the knowledge that it had been entitled the Blair Atholl Eightsome Reel and dedicated to the Atholl Highlanders provided some new special information.

The name of Helen, Lady Forbes, on the title page engendered further research, and great interest was aroused when it was discovered that she was the second daughter of Sir Thomas Moncreiffe of that Ilk (7th Bart.) and married to Sir Charles Forbes of Newe. Lord Frederic Hamilton's memoirs state that "she was the most perfect example of classical beauty I have ever seen."

The eight daughters of Sir Thomas were regarded as celebrated Victorian beauties, Helen's elder sister, Louisa, becoming the wife of the 7th Duke of Atholl (the parents of Lord James Stewart Murray, 9th Duke of Atholl, who was an early President of the Royal Scottish Country Dance Society). Another sister, Blanche, married Charles Murray of Taymount, a grandson of the 3rd Earl of Mansfield (whose descendant was also a past President of the RSCDS).



One may deduce that this young gathering at Blair Castle when the afore-mentioned were all in their twenties or early thirties, was a happy one, enjoying the music and fun of the dances. With Lord Dunmore, this house party selected some of the figures of the Eightsome Reel from the popular round reels of the time, and with adaptions gave us this worldwide best-known Scottish dance.

[The following is a copy of the directions as published in the original copy. So the variety of capitals etc is copying what was in the original. - Ed.]

The Eightsome Reel is Danced Thus,

Four Couples form a Square as in a Quadrille

Part 1st

All join hands, round to left (4 bars) back to the right (4 bars)
Ladies cross right hands in centre keeping hold of their partner
with the left hand, and dance around to left (4 bars)
Each couple swing round, and gentlemen cross left hands in
centre still keeping hold of their partner with right hand,
and dance back to places (4 bars)
All "Set to Partners" (4 bars) turn partners (4 bars)

Part 2nd

Grand Chain all round (16 bars)

First Lady in centre - The rest join hands round to the left (4 bars) back to right (4 bars)

First Lady "Set to Partner" (2 bars) and turn partner (2 bars)

Set to opposite gentleman (2 bars) and turn (2 bars)

First Lady and both gentlemen dance a reel of three and Gentlemen return to places - (8 bars)

First Lady remain in the centre and the others join hands round to the left (4 bars) back to the right (4 bars)

"Set" to side gentleman (2 bars) and turn (2 bar)

"Set" to opposite (side) gentleman (2 bars) and turn (2 bars)

Reel of three, as before, and all return to places (8 bars)

The same Figure is repeated by the other 3 ladies in turn.

Part 3rd

First gentleman in centre and th others join hands and dance around etc and the same Figure as the Ladies danced in Part 2nd is repeated by the 4 gentlemen in turn.

4th & Last Part

Is danced the same as 1st Part.

Note: In "Setting to Partners" the ordinary reel steps are danced

Dancing During "These Times"

The advent of CoVid-19 has had an existential impact on music, song, and dance events. In early July, I attended an online Web Chat that was organized by the Country Dance and Song Society on the topics "How can we keep our communities safe in a pandemic? When can we dance and sing in the same place again? What does it mean to be a dance/music/song organizer when we can't be together?"

There were over 400 participants, mostly from North America, and the moderators included a family physician, an epidemiologist/contact tracer, a dance organizer, several musicians, and a singer. There was lots of information about how the virus is transmitted (most of which is familiar by now) and many different perspectives; but all reach the same conclusion: It is not going to be safe to resume our traditional dance and music events for quite a while!

However, it was interesting how many of them also stressed it is important to keep engaging with our community, reinventing our activities, and preparing for an eventual, joyful reunion. So, even if our music and dance activities are not as satisfying as they are in person, it is important to keep doing as much as we can to keep the flame alive!
