- Alasdair Fraser & Natalie Haas: SYZYGY!!! Look it up, or go to alasdairfraser.com and see what Alasdair has to say about it. Syzygy is derived from a Greek word "to link," and has applications in science, philosophy, music and the Scottish psyche. Alasdair says, "We have played for many of you in lots of wild & wondrous, crazy & beautiful, far-flung parts of the world and we can't wait to come back and visit!"
- *Don Bartlett* is one of the pre-eminent Scottish dance piano soloists of our age. 

At this virtual workshop, I will share and teach a selection of Cèilidh dances adapted specifically for remote video conferencing. Hullachan, or Reel of Tulloch

The Reel of Tulloch or Hullachan with its simple structure, alternating eight bars of setting with eight bars of swinging with right and then left arms, looks like a traditional dance. Instead it is a product of early 19th century romantic Scottish nationalism. However, the tune accompanying the dance is traditional, and predates the dance by at least 60 years and probably longer. Unusually, RSCDS Book 3 insists that the dance be done to this tune and no other.

Queen Victoria enjoyed both watching and participating in The Reel of Tulloch. The diary kept by the royal dancing master Joseph Lowe has this note on the dance, here significantly danced by four aristocratic men:

It was this reel that especially delights Her Majesty, Queen Victoria, when on a visit to Scotland in 1842. At the Ball given by the Marquis of Breadalbane, at Taymouth Castle, the original figure of *The Reel o' Tulloch* was danced in the royal presence, with admirable characteristic spirit, by the Marquis of Abercorn, the Hon. Fox Maule, Cluny MacPherson, and Davidson of Tulloch. The Queen herself seemed quite elated during the performance of this ancient Reel and expressed herself much delighted and astonished at the lively execution displayed by the dancers.

Lowe's diary records several occasions at Balmoral or Windsor when the Queen and her family danced the *Reel*. Clearly they enjoyed the vigour and freedom of the dance, and clearly Lowe is somewhat disapproving. Elsewhere Lowe comments that the Queen's Highland steps were too rough for ladies; as a dancing master he sought to impart smoothness and elegance.

The first version of *The Reel of Tulloch* with its grab-bag of figures lasted for a good half century, from its early publication in *The Ballroom Annual* for 1844 to the publication in the ca. 1890 edition of Allan's popular dance manual. Below is the dance from W.F. Gillies' *Manual of Dancing* (ca. 1890), which is identical to that in *The Ballroom Annual*.

Stand as for a Scotch Reel, or reel of four, all set, and reel figure of eight, the two gentlemen set facing each other, all go round after each other in a circle, ladies take to the centre and set to partners, they reel as before, gentlemen take to centre and set to reverse partners, they circle as before, the two gentlemen set and turn around with right arms locked, they reel as before, ladies take the centre, set and turn each other, first with right arms, and then with left arms locked, they circle as before, gentlemen take the centre, set and turn the ladies.

Lowe's descriptions of *The Reel of Tulloch* danced by the royal family show that its most distinctive and exhilarating part was the swinging turn. On 26 December 1860, for example "They [two princesses and the Prince of Wales] all danced a *Reel*, then *The Reel of Tulloch* with Charlotte, she and the Prince of Wales were the Gentlemen, they had a nice swing...."

As the dance became popular, it was simplified. The version published in many late 19th and early 20th century Guides has the two ladies setting and swinging, opposite partners setting and swinging, the two gentlemen setting and swinging, and partners setting and swinging. This, of course, is the same as the version given by the RSCDS in Book 3.

The teaching team of a dozen or more teachers from around North America (as widespread as California, Florida, Nova Scotia, the Washington DC area and teachers from all over New England and New York), collaborated on wonderful programs for an Introduction to Scottish Country Dance and two dance parties, Saturday and Sunday evenings.

Because Sunday was the end of The Flurry and Terpsichore were up for it, the group danced a program of fourteen dances and would have done more if they had been programmed. There were easily 100 people at each of the parties from around the world, many of whom would not have been able to make it to The Flurry in person.

As evidenced by this branch-wide participation, the Albany Class both benefits from and contributes to the whole of the Boston Branch. Dancing in cyberspace is definitely not the same, but it did allow for a much broader participation. The Flurry itself also included teachers in many genres from around the world, who would not have been able to participate in person in a normal year, so it was a novel, challenging and joyous weekend.

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
