Here is what one participant wrote: "The Frolic was joyous excellence from the very beginning to the end – from dance selection, to advertising, MCing, sound, and musicians. Wow, it was a diamond, and is one we will carry in our hearts."

We had more than forty logins. At least six in-person pods participated from New Zealand to Maine, Northern VA, Binghamton, Boston, Albany.

We built the event with the intention of best serving our hybrid audience, working to ensure a quality experience for those dancing over zoom as a "pod" or individuals as well as the two sets dancing at Newbitz House (Albany class location). 

Dance Legacies of Scotland: The True Glen Orchy Kick

Knowing both Mats and Jen, and enjoying Cape Breton dancing myself, it was a no-brainer: I needed to get hold of this book. But a first dip into its pages lead to more reasons to continue reading, to absorb and savor. Not only does it look at evidence of percussive dance in Scotland, but also relates it to the history of other dancing styles (country, highland, ladies step, and more) in ballrooms, inns, and kitchens, on stage, and at crossroads.

Writings from as far back as the 1700s through to present day recollections touch on multiple places, times, social strata, and individual influencers. (Many of the names appearing in the last chapter will be familiar to you!) From clues suggesting the old rough percussive side of Scottish dancing, to the shift away from it, and then reintroduction in the 1980's to what is now a living percussive tradition in Scotland as well as Cape Breton.

It's a fascinating braided journey, where dance like any living tradition evolves. But like language, we see that dance forms can be lost if not passed on. Never feel inferior or hide away the dancing you enjoy. Or it might disappear ... unless luck nurtures it elsewhere ... and eventually braids it back.



Robert Burns, Scottish Country Dancer

by Kirsteen McCue, Professor of Scottish Literature and Song Culture at the University of Glasgow, and Co-Editor of a multi-volume collection of the entire works of Robert Burns

Burns biographers have already established that Burns had an interest in the fiddle early in his life. Anecdotal evidence from his little sister, Isabella, later in her life, suggests that Burns tried hard to learn to play the fiddle, even if he never acquired enough skill to keep a dance tune going. ... Burns's letters are a fine source of evidence about his knowledge of existing and contemporary fiddle tunes. In his 'seventeeth year,' he recounts to Dr. John Moore in August 1787, he attended 'a country dance school' (Letters, I, 139), where he would have learnt common country dances accompanied by a solo fiddler. And this education in dancing and the fiddle tunes for dances continued for Burns and his brother Gilbert at the Bachelor's Club in Tarbolton, which they established and ran between 1781 and 1783. Indeed, the fiddle belonging to William Gregg, their dancing master, is still in existence. It can be can be seen at the Robert Burns Birthplace Museum in Alloway and it is still played at special events at the Bachelor's Club today. ~

Flowers of the Forest

Michael Justin Little (just Mike to us) was born May 19, 1948 in Caribou, Maine. He died Friday, October 1, 2021 in Bucksport, Maine, surrounded by many of the people he loved, on the farm that he loved. Mike was the epitome of the Renaissance Man – a scholar and a farmer; a dancer (Scottish, Contra, Morris, Irish Set, and English, and ...) and a carpenter; a musician and a beekeeper; a book collector and an environmentalist; a fierce cribbage player and a top-notch birder, and so much more. He was a man of many interests and passions who lived and loved life to the fullest. Prior to his retirement, he spent more than 10 years as the Executive Director at Island Heritage Trust in Deer Isle, Maine where he strove to help the community understand the importance of protecting nature, and the island, for future generations. Before that he made significant

work at the Belgrade Lakes Association, Belgrade, Maine, and Bonnyvale Environmental Education Center in Brattleboro, Vermont. He contributed to Herpetological Atlases in both Maine and Vermont. He celebrated every May Day with bells on as a Morris Dancer in both Vermont and Maine. He caught the SCD bug over 20 years ago in Vermont, and we all remember hearing his joyous "Hoot!" at parties and in classes. He and Dawn brought Scottish Country Dancing to life in the Blue Hill Peninsula area and annually at the Highland Games. Mike died too soon, at 73 years young. His loss will be felt profoundly by us all.

Colin Robertson passed away peacefully in his sleep in the evening of June 28, 2021 in McMinnville, Oregon. Along with Lewis Innes, Colin had been proprietor of the Scottish National Dance Company which organized competitions and workshops in Highland and Scottish Country dancing, and sold dancing resources including 'Slip Stop,' which he invented. Colin was a professional dancer and teacher. When he lived in

Reading, England, he participated in the Reading Traditional and Step Dance group, a.k.a. the Reading Cloggies. Well-known dances Colin choreographed include Cockney Jocks and the Black Bear Medley. He also published booklets relating to the history of hardshoe dancing practices of Scotland.

Colin worked as a scientific glass blower at Imperial College, London. He also, for many years, ran a weekly Highland Dance class at Imperial College which he accompanied on his tin whistle. His group gave performances at various events around England. He taught Highland Dancing for the Royal Ballet School. While he was known to brag that he was a student of the University of Life, he studied at the Imperial College and apprenticed at UKAEA Harwell. Colin's formative teachers of Highland Dancing were Pipe Major Peter Ouinn, Sandy Blyth, Georgina Kirk, and Gabriella Nixon. Colin was predeceased by his wife, Terie.

Saint Andrew

One of the twelve Apostles, and brother to Saint Peter. His feast day is November 30th in Scotland where he is the country's patron saint. He never set foot in Scotland during his lifetime although he did travel to Scythia and Russia as the first missionary to the Muscovites. He returned to Jerusalem, then went to Greece. Among his converts was the wife of the Roman governor of Patrae. Angered by his wife's conversion the

Governor ordered Andrew to be crucified. Professing himself unworthy to die on the same cross as that on which Christ suffered, he chose the cross which we know as the 'St. Andrew's Cross' (i.e. diagonal, like an X). His body was buried by the Governor's wife, but the bones were later transferred to Constantinople's Church of the Apostles. In 1208, a Cardinal Capuano removed the relics to Amalfi where they now rest in a gold reliquary in Amalfi cathedral.

According to the Aberdeen Breviary, Cardinal Capuano brought only the remainder of the Saint's bones to Amalfi. Scottish monks stated that when the body was still at Patrae, the custodian of the relics was visited by an angel who ordered him to take three finger bones,

an arm bone and the knee-cap of St. Andrew and journey to the western limits of the world and there establish a city in honour of the Apostle. In the Reign of Angus, successor of King Nechtan of the Picts (A.D. 10), a stranger appeared bearing the bones which he said were those of St. Andrew. The King, impressed, allowed him to build a Church at Kilrymont on the Fifeshire coast.

By tradition, St. Andrew was chosen as Scotland's patron saint at the time of the battle of Athelstanford in the 10th century. A Scottish and Pictish army under King Angus clashed with the Saxons under King Athelstan at the ford over Cogtail Burn in East Lothian. Inspiration came to the Scots at the sight of the white cross of the Saint which appeared in the sky and they fought and won.
