



Drawn from my 24 years as music columnist for *Scottish Life* magazine, the essays in this book usher you through a panorama of musical styles and history, helping you appreciate songs in Gaelic, Scots, and English, music of the pipes, fiddle, harp, and more.

Journey through a music and culture that is rich and varied, influential in western folk and classical music, and yet relatively little examined in its own right. Let this book be your tour guide to the nooks and crannies of an amazing musical landscape. Enjoy cover to cover, or read any chapter on its own. Julie Smith, Julie Smith, Where Have You Been? I've Been To Scotland To Dance With The Queen!

It was all the Queen's fault...My plans were complete: a week at Pinewoods to celebrate our 20th year there, followed by a charter flight to Scotland with the Clan Sutherland Pipe Band and two weeks at the RSCDS Summer School at St. Andrews University where there would be festivities marking the Society's 50th birthday. Then Her Majesty graciously consented to attend a Jubilee Ball to be given by the Edinburgh Branch on July 12. Realizing this was a once in a lifetime chance, I dropped my carefully laid plans and started over. Sadly, Pinewoods was out, the first summer missed in 20 years. A quick note to Duncan MacLeod brought the reply that, indeed an escort was needed and, as no man from Boston was going, the search was on. Unexpectedly came an overseas call from Naomi Dunkin, former Montreal dancer, now in Exeter, England. Not only did she have an escort for me, but I knew him, and moments later I was speaking with Tim Holland whom I had met at Pawling two years earlier when he came over to visit his Washington-based parents (also dancers and just returned to England). Several letters later all was arranged and I would meet the Exeter group at the hotel Tim had booked in Edinburgh. Then came the problem of switching my time at St. Andrews from the second to the first fortnight, not an easy request to fulfill, with dancers from all over the world eager to be in "mecca" during this celebration year. Although Miss Milligan wrote that she would do her best, I still didn't know when I would return as I boarded an Aer Lingus 747 on the 94 degree evening of July 9 [editor's note – 1973].

Edinburgh was its beautiful, grey self, brightened by thousands of roses in the Princes Street gardens. After settling into the brand new King James Hotel at the head of Leith St, the first order of business was to visit Society Headquarters in Coates Crescent. The new Secretary, Mrs. Burt, was most pleasant and I was relieved to learn that I would be able to attend Summer School at the earlier date. By the time the Exeter contingent arrived on the afternoon of the Ball, I felt I would be in excellent condition for the 27-dance program, having had two strenuous days of walking and sightseeing. The moment finally arrived, and Naomi, her partner Layton Morris, Tim and I left for the Assembly Rooms and Music Hall in George Street where 600 people were gathering to dance in the two ballrooms, upstairs. After a word with Miss Milligan, who was joyously greeting friends from everywhere, Mina Corson pulled me away to be interviewed with other overseas visitors for a program being filmed by Grampian TV for a series of programs on the RSCDS. The Hunns from the Delaware group were there; also, Jack Rennie from Los Angeles, Bob Millar and Valerie Harris from Toronto and dancers from as far away as South Africa and New Zealand. Jack and I were on camera together and were asked a number of questions by a knowledgeable gentleman. I believe I managed to get in the fact that Boston was proud to be the first Branch on this continent.

Upstairs, the Ball was going gaily on, the same program in both rooms, with one closed down during each of the two supper breaks. There were a few familiar faces – the Courages from St Catherines, the Eastons from Cleveland, and Charlie Robertson from N.Y., who had come at the last minute, but mostly a sea of strange faces, a rather unusual situation for me. I felt the bands were not too inspiring and wished our two fine Canadian bands had been there to liven things up. Finally we were told that the Queen was on her way. Duncan MacLeod, an MC for the latter part of the evening, had told me just where to stand. I was rewarded by being quite close as the Royal Party entered the Ballroom, the Queen looking very tiny but regal in a simple white gown and Royal Stewart sash. As Miss Milligan said at St Andrews, she felt the Queen paid the society a great compliment by not wearing a tiara. "It meant," said Miss Milligan, "that she was one of us." And indeed she seemed to be, as she danced several times and obviously enjoyed it. Prince Philip and Princess Anne also danced and looked genuinely happy. Fashion note for the men: Prince Philip had scarlet lapels on his Prince Charlie jacket and one member of the Royal Party wore a tartan doublet cut on the bias! And although there was no air conditioning not a single doublet or jacket was removed during the six-hour program.

We knew which dances the Queen would do – Petronella, Monymusk, the Duke of Perth, and the Eightsome Reel, and Charlie Robertson asked me for Petronella, if and when it was requested. Only a few moments later, the Queen and her set came out of the anteroom and Petronella was announced. Charlie and I

happened to be standing near the spot where that set would form and we managed to get into the set just below as third couple. This meant that by the time the Queen and her partner finished being active and were in 4th place, Charlie and I were waiting out at the top of our set and therefore, I was standing next to her! Since I felt it impolite to turn to look directly at her, I used my peripheral vision, sharpened by years of Monday night [ed. - the Boston Branch class] training. That moment of itself made my whole trip worthwhile and will be my claim to fame forever!

Her Majesty danced rather tentatively at first and, titled though he was, her partner, Sir Iain Moncrieff of that Ilk, wasn't much help; however, having gone successfully through the dance, she relaxed and requested

it once more – this time all smiles, as she danced, The Royal Party enjoyed themselves enough to remain for two hours and at one point the Queen was heard to say to Princess Anne before a dance, "Wish me luck, dearie!" As they left, I managed to take a picture of the Oueen as security was unnecessary and almost non-existent. At 2 AM, four exhausted dancers limped back to the King James for a few hours' rest before starting the journey to Exeter. Next morning we rushed out for the papers and found a picture with a good shot of Charlie. I didn't know until I reached St Andrews ten days later that the Glasgow Sunday Record had a color photo showing the Queen and her partner coming up the middle on Petronella, with Charlie and me right behind her!

Once in Exeter, between Devon cream teas (bowls of thick clotted cream to spread on your freshly-baked scones) it was time to think of the demonstration the Exeter team was giving on the final day of a week-long fair in the village of Winkleigh, on the Moor. I had been invited to participate so a white dress was duly found and

altered. Unfortunately, it rained, and instead of the village square, we were inside along with the children's costume parade and the local band. It was rather unnerving to do an unknown dance, the Inverness Reel, without a rehearsal, but it went well and we were rewarded with yet another cream tea! On another occasion, those dancers still around Exeter in the summer gathered at the school where Naomi teaches for pleasant evening during which I taught them Boston Hospitality and Pinewoods Reel.

After an all too short five-day visit, Tim and Naomi insisted on driving me to Birmingham where I was to spend some time with Anna Holden who visited the Boston Branch last Fall. No Scottish activities there, but some delightful days in the Cotswolds, plus visits to Warwick and Kenilworth Castles, and Coventry and Worcester Cathedrals. Then it was time to leave for St Andrews where Anna would teach the Certificate class. Her daughter Diane was with us for her first Summer School visit and we made the trip in a leisurely two days, going via Castle Douglas to pick up Margaret Rae, one of the regular pianists. There were 300 at the school, many more than usual, and it was rather like Pinewoods or any regular annual gathering as people greeted each other. There were Swedes, Dutch, French, South Africans and Canadians as well as a number of Americans. I was especially happy to see Dinah Stix [sp? ed.] from Middlebury, Vermont and Ron Krug, now in Toronto, previously in Montreal and Winnipeg. A number of his Winnipeg friends were there and they warmly included Dinah and me in their group.

Two weeks at St. Andrews could be a book in itself. It is truly an inspiring experience, as well as a lot of hard work, and one which I wish each dancer could have at least once. The trouble is, once makes you want to

go back because you've made so many friends you'll never see any place else. Highlights of this year's school were a formal dinner given to us by the University complete with wine and a magnificent speech by the Vice Principal. The after-dinner entertainment, billed as a "conversazione" included a showing of the three newly-composed Jubilee Dances. To me, the outstanding thing was meeting the fabled Irenee Grant Caithness, one of the dancers in Miss Milligan's most famous International Team of 25 years ago, and still referred to constantly by Miss Milligan as one of the most beautiful dancers she ever taught. Now the wife of a St. Andrews physician,

and wearing high heeled slippers as she danced the Eightsome Reel, it was still possible to see what Miss Milligan means. There is so much to remember – Miss Milligan's classes of 90-100 at Younger Hall with the remarkable Kitty at the piano; the delicious food, unlike any institution cooking I've ever experienced (but bring your own napkin!); sitting in the first row at the Byre Theatre for \$1.50; buying a quart of fresh raspberries for 50 cents; singing for two hours straight on the bus coming back from a demonstration at Pitlochry; the ceilidh with Miss McLaren impersonating Miss Milligan leading a ladies' (really men in long black skirts and hair nets) wand exercise class circa 1923; and a Highland dance done to native music by two Hawaiian beach boys who had supposedly received one lesson from a Highland teacher just passing through.

Suddenly, I was leaving as a new group including Peggy O'Connor, Freddy Sverdlove, and the Lapiners arrived. My Aer Lingus plane took me to Dublin where Pat, Peg, and Anne Hodgson, more former Montreal dancers, gave me a real taste of Irish hospitality for my last few days. Pat is in pretty good shape following his auto accident of last year which necessitated a bone graft in one leg. Eventually he'll dance a little, though sadly never in his former exuberant style. A day at the Royal Dublin Horse Show and bumping into a college classmate of twenty-five years ago outside the Trinity College Library. Then it was time to leave for Boston, arriving in the same 94 degree heat I had left to find a brand new kitchen floor which Bob had put down in my absence. So it pays to go away, but it was pretty nice to be home and share a memorable summer with my family and friends.
