



Boston Branch Bookstore


Have you ever wondered where all these dances come from? Perhaps your latest favorite is *The Dancing Man*, with a ripping reel by Muriel Johnstone. Turns out it was devised by Roy Goldring, late of the Leeds Branch in the U.K. He wrote many favorite dances and here is one of his books (two of them together, actually), containing also *The Shores of Solway*, *The Society Piper*, *Castle Douglas*, *Dunfermline Glen* and many more, complete with the title tunes written by a variety of the best contemporary composers, some of whom you may have met in person.



Or perhaps it's one of the older dances that catches your fancy. One of the most sustainably popular dances ever is *The Montgomeries' Rant*, and it

is in Book 10 of the RSCDS collection. In addition you will find *General Stuart's Reel*, *Isle of Skye*, *There's Nae Luck Aboot the Hoose*, and *Miss Mary Douglas*, and several more to round out the twelve. This book also contains the music, but the names of the composers ring out from previous centuries such as Nathaniel Gow, Robert Bremner, Daniel Dow.

Strathspeys, Puirt-a-beul and Diddling



The strathspeys in puirt-a-beul are very quick. Some people have the idea that that's where the strathspeys originated, from the Gaelic puirt-a-beul. It's hard to say though – there are other stories. It's said there was a drunken fiddler at a wedding in Strathspey. He got filled up with so much drink he couldn't play the reels fast, so he played them slow and someone said, "That sounds good." That's only a story, I think. One of the first ones to play strathspeys was Angus Cumming, from Grantown. It was Bremner's Collection in 1757 which had "strathspey reels."

The port-a-beul is mouth music, it's for the days when you haven't got any instrumental music at all, and people just sang that for dancing. I remember this old friend of mine, he was a station master for years, John Monaghan, he was of Irish extraction – one time when he was a young fellow he went over to see his relations

in Ireland. They were saying, "Are you staying for the dance?! On Friday night, it'll be a great night, Seamus will be there himself, the great Seamus." So he was looking forward to it. He arrived up at the school, and there was this old guy sitting in a chair in the corner, with a glass of whisky, and everyone was going up to him and being very deferential. Suddently he was up, doing "Diddlie dae do diddly ro ho dum." And that was the band! He diddled all night – jigs, reels. He was famous for diddling and he could go for hours.

[Aonghas, the left-handed fiddler of Lochaber, is now 90 years old and still performing and telling stories like the one here. He and his wife Moira live in Lochyside, near Fort William. – Asst. Ed.]

Place Names

Place names are often in the language used before the current language and thus often not written down. In other words oral and referring to old beliefs and usage. Here are a few from Perthshire, where many of our traditional dances originated. (Reference – David Watson's *Making Sense of Place Names in Perthshire*.)

Aber: used as a prefix in river names, meaning "the mouth of." Also refers to a confluence, the place where two rivers meet. A very old word deriving from Brythonic.

Auchterarder: a combination of Gaelic and Brythonic which literally means "upland of high water," which seems rather strange. Which water? Was there a loch on the ridge which Auchterarder occupies? Breadalbane: describes the "upper or higher part of Albain, or Scotland."

Drummond: describes a "ridge or a hump," as at the location of Drummond Castle near Crieff.

Dunkeld: "The fort of the Caledonians," the name the Romans gave to the Picts. First recorded about 865AD as Duincaillen. At one time it was the most important religious centre in Scotland.

Forteviot: Now a small village, but originally an important royal centre. Not entirely clear exactly what the name means, though the first part relates to its "position on a terraced slope," on the right bank of the Earn.

Glen: "Narrow valley," as opposed to strath, which is a wide valley.

Inver: common prefix, meaning "mouth of or confluence."

Perth: name comes from the Pictish word for "thicket or bush." Following the building of St. John's Kirk in the 12th century, it became known as St. Johnstowne, to eventually revert to its Pictish name.

Schiehallion: Possibly the name means "maiden's breast" but also suggested it means "fairy mountain." Associated with mystery and legend.

Tulloch: describes the location of a farm on a "slope."

In the mornings we went on the boat for two dives, visiting sites with evocative names such as Champagne Reef, named for the bubbles rising from volcanic activity beneath the sea floor, and l'Abyme (the abyss), named for the tall cliffs overlooking the shore. The Dive Master led the group, pointing out special creatures such as sea horses, moray eels, spiny lobsters, coral shrimp, and spotted scorpionfish. On three of the afternoons/evenings we enjoyed dancing to the programs devised and MC'd by Chris Harris and Terry Harvey. On Friday morning, when many of us had to avoid diving 24 hours ahead of our flights, we toured the Titou Gorge and the Trafalgar Falls.

This ScubaDance trip to Dominica was organized by Mel and Ellie Briscoe and had originally been planned for June, 2018; but a combination of hurricane Maria and CoVid-19 delayed the trip four years. We were all glad we finally made it to Dominica!
